COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to S.P. 609, L.D. 1652, Bill, "An Act To Authorize the Commissioner of Marine Resources To Limit the Number of Shrimp Licenses That May Be Used in Certain Seasons"

Amend the bill by striking out all of section 2 and inserting the following:

Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §6804, sub-§2-A is enacted to read:

2-A. Licenses limited. The commissioner may establish by rule a system to limit the number of commercial northern shrimp licenses issued under this section when the total allowable catch for northern shrimp established for Maine by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission is less than 2,000 metric tons. Rules adopted pursuant to this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

Prior to initiating rulemaking, the commissioner shall consult with members of the northern shrimp industry, including individuals who are eligible to obtain a license that allows fishing for or taking northern shrimp and holders of a license or permit issued under chapter 625 that allows wholesale or retail activity involving northern shrimp.

The commissioner shall provide a report regarding management of the northern shrimp resource and the northern shrimp fishing industry to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over marine resources matters by January 15th of the year following a year in which the commissioner limited the number of licenses issued under this section. The joint standing committee may report out legislation to the session of the Legislature in which the report was received regarding management of the northern shrimp resource or the northern shrimp fishing industry.'

SUMMARY

This amendment, like the bill, authorizes the Commissioner of Marine Resources to adopt rules to establish a system by which the number of commercial northern shrimp licenses issued may be limited in a season when the total allowable catch for Maine is less than 2,000 metric tons. The amendment requires the commissioner to consult with

1 members of the northern shrimp industry prior to initiating rulemaking to limit the
2 number of commercial northern shrimp licenses. The amendment also requires the
3 commissioner, if the commissioner limits the number of commercial northern shrimp
4 licenses, to provide a report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having
5 jurisdiction over marine resources matters regarding management of the northern shrimp
6 resource and the northern shrimp fishing industry. The joint standing committee may
7 report out legislation based upon that report.

Fiscal Detail and Notes

This bill would authorize the Department of Marine Resources to adopt rules to limit the number of licenses issued to establish a limited commercial northern shrimp fishery when the total allowable catch as authorized by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission is less than 2,000 metric tons. Because the number of licenses issued would be contingent upon the total allowable catch authorized, no estimate is made at this time of the number of licenses that will be issued. However, since no commercial northern shrimp licenses have been issued since fiscal year 2013-14, any licenses issued would increase revenue to the General Fund and the Shrimp Management Fund. Any additional costs to the department to adopt rules limiting the number of commercial northern shrimp licenses or to report on the commercial northern shrimp industry are anticipated to be minor and can be absorbed within existing budgeted resources.
