4 5 6 7	A. Operates a motor vehicle on a public way, as defined in Title 17-A, section 505 subsection 2, or in a parking area when that person's license to operate a motor vehicle has been revoked under this subchapter or former Title 29, chapter 18-A and that person:
8	(1) Has received written notice of the revocation from the Secretary of State;
9	(2) Has been orally informed of the revocation by a law enforcement officer;
10	(3) Has actual knowledge of the revocation; or
11 12	(4) Is a person to whom written notice was sent in accordance with section 2482 or former Title 29, section 2241, subsection 4; or

14 15 16 17 18	Current law provides that a person commits the crime of operating after habitual offender revocation if that person operates a motor vehicle on a public way when that person's license to operate a motor vehicle has been revoked under certain circumstances. This bill provides that a person also commits the crime of operating after habitual offender revocation if that person operates a motor vehicle in a parking area when that person's license to operate a motor vehicle has been revoked under certain circumstances.
