A. State funds, gifts and appropriations for school food service programs, including state funds specifically for school administrative units with a public school in which at least 50% of students qualified for a free or reduced-price lunch during the preceding school year that operate an alternative breakfast delivery service that provides breakfast after the start of the school day pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph D; and'

Amend the bill by striking out all of section 3 and inserting the following:

'Sec. 3. Appropriations and allocations. The following appropriations and allocations are made.

### EDUCATION, DEPARTMENT OF

### **School Finance and Operations Z078**

Initiative: Provides ongoing funding to school administrative units that operate alternative breakfast delivery services that provide breakfast after the start of the school day. A school administrative unit with a public school in which at least 50% of students qualified for a free or reduced-price lunch during the preceding school year qualifies for funding. The department is required to develop guidelines to allocate and disburse the funding to participating schools. Guidelines must be developed within 90 days following the effective date of this Act.

SUMMARY 26

> The bill requires a school administrative unit with a public school in which at least 50% of students qualified for a free or reduced-price lunch during the preceding school year to operate an alternative breakfast delivery service.

> This amendment, which is the majority report, clarifies that the alternative breakfast delivery service provides breakfast after the start of the school day and before any lunch period in the school begins for students at that public school. The amendment also provides that a school administrative unit or a public school in which at least 70% of students who are eligible for free and reduced-price meals participate in the breakfast program is exempt from the requirement of providing an alternative breakfast delivery service. The amendment revises the process as proposed in the bill for a school

#### **Fiscal Detail and Notes**

This bill includes ongoing General Fund appropriations of \$500,000 per year beginning in fiscal year 2019-20 to the School Finance and Operations program within the Department of Education to provide funding to those school administrative units that operate alternative breakfast delivery services that provide breakfast after the start of the school day.

This fiscal note assumes that the public hearings required to be held in order for a school administrative unit to opt out of the alternative breakfast delivery service will be held during a regularly scheduled meeting of the local school administrative unit's governing board and that the required public notice will be provided as part of the regular notice of a meeting of the governing board.
