COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 1168, L.D. 1616, Bill, "An Act To Establish the Vaccine Consumer Protection Program" 10

Amend the bill in section 1 in \$1071 in subsection 4 in paragraph G in subparagraph (2) in the last line (page 3, line 17 in L.D.) by striking out the following: "and"

Amend the bill in section 1 in §1071 in subsection 4 in paragraph H in subparagraph (10) in the last line (page 4, line 10 in L.D.) by striking out the following: "." and inserting the following: '; and'

Amend the bill in section 1 in §1071 in subsection 4 by inserting at the end a new 16 17 paragraph to read:

18 I. Review the forms submitted to the office under section 1082 and submit a report annually to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over 19 20 health and human services matters regarding information received on the forms and any trends." 21

Amend the bill in section 1 by striking out all of §1074 and inserting the following:

\\$1074. Vaccine death investigations 23

1. Authority to investigate. Upon the request of the next of kin of the deceased 24 person, the office shall investigate a death that is suspected to have been caused by the 25 administration of a vaccine. 26

Review of medical records. The office may have access to health care information of a deceased person upon the completion of an appropriate release by the next of kin of the deceased person. "Health care information" has the same meaning as in section 1711-C, subsection 1, paragraph E. Health care information obtained under this section is confidential, is not a public record as defined in Title 1, section 402, subsection 3 and may not be made available for inspection by the public.

33 3. Interviews. The office may conduct voluntary interviews with the family, 34 medical providers of the deceased person upon the completion of an appropriate release

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by the next of kin of the deceased person or any other individual involved in the deceased person's care and health.

4. Report. The office shall provide the next of kin of a deceased person under subsection 1 a detailed report regarding the investigation. The office shall post on a publicly accessible website its report after removing all personally identifying information of the deceased person.'

Amend the bill in section 1 by inserting after §1081 the following section to read:

8 <u>§1082. Form regarding recent vaccinations</u>

9 A health care provider who provides primary care to a child under 18 years of age 10 shall provide to the parent, guardian or custodian of the child a form for the parent, 11 guardian or custodian to complete. The form must include a request for the child's most 12 recent immunization and the date of that immunization. A parent, guardian or custodian 13 must complete the form to the best of the parent's, guardian's or custodian's ability. The 14 provider shall remove the personally identifying information of the child from the form 15 and submit it to the office.'

- 16 Amend the bill in section 1 to renumber the sections to read consecutively.
- 17 Amend the bill by adding after section 1 the following:
- 18 'Sec. 2. PL 2019, c. 154 is repealed.'
- 19 Amend the bill by adding after section 3 the following:

SUMMARY

This amendment, which is the minority report of the committee, clarifies the 26 activities of the Vaccine Consumer Protection Office in investigating a death that is 27 suspected to have been caused by the administration of a vaccine. It also requires a 28 health care provider who provides primary care to a child under the age of 18 to provide 29 to the parent, guardian or custodian of the child a form for the parent, guardian or 30 custodian to complete requesting the child's most recent immunization and the date of 31 that immunization and requires the health care provider to remove the personally 32 identifying information of the child from the form and submit it to the Vaccine Consumer 33 Protection Office. The Vaccine Consumer Protection Office is directed to submit a report 34 35 annually to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters regarding information received on the forms and any trends. 36 37 The amendment also repeals Public Law 2019, chapter 154, "An Act To Protect Maine

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Children and Students from Preventable Diseases by Repealing Certain Exemptions from the Laws Governing Immunization Requirements."

The amendment retains the provisions in the bill that establish the Vaccine Consumer Protection Program; establish treatment and administration guidelines for vaccines; specify a health care provider's rights to refuse to administer a vaccine and a patient's right to refuse a vaccine; prohibit incentives to administer vaccines, vaccine administration without a prescription and vaccine prescription by standing order; require an annual report on adverse event reports; provide for religious and medical exemptions; add the vaccine injury table to a provider reference manual; and require health care provider licensing boards to amend their rules to conform to the provisions in the bill, among other provisions.

The amendment also adds an appropriations and allocations section.

Fiscal Detail and Notes

The bill includes General Fund appropriations to the Department of Health and Human Services of \$607,788 in fiscal year 2019-20 and \$600,746 in fiscal year 2020-21 for one Public Service Manager II position, one Public Health Physician position, one Planning and Research Associate II position, one Health Program Manager position and one Office Associate II position to run the new program. Additionally, the funding provides for contracts to prepare and complete the 2 annual forums and the development of a database and website and on-going funding to host the database.

Additional costs to the licensing boards within or affiliated with the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation that are responsible for the licensing of a health care provider associated with the rulemaking process can be absorbed within existing budgeted resources
