4 5 6 7 8 9	<b>5.</b> Additional duties of the director. The director also serves as the director of the Gambling Control Unit, established as a bureau within the Department of Public Safety under Title 25, section 2902, subsection 12. As director of the unit, the director shall administer and enforce the laws governing fantasy contests under chapter 33, sports wagering under chapter 35 and beano and games of chance under Title 17, chapters 13-A and 62, respectively.

18	<b>REGULATION OF SPORTS WAGERING</b>
19	§1201. Authorization of sports wagering
20 21 22	Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, the operation of sports wagering and ancillary activities are lawful when conducted in accordance with the provisions of this chapter and the rules of the director.
23	§1202. Definitions
24 25	As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
26 27 28 29 30	<b>1.</b> Adjusted gross sports wagering receipts. "Adjusted gross sports wagering receipts" means an operator's gross receipts from sports wagering less the total of all winnings paid to patrons, which includes the cash equivalent of any merchandise or thing of value awarded as a prize, and less excise tax payments remitted to the Federal Government.
31 32 33	<b><u>2. Collegiate sports or athletic event.</u></b> "Collegiate sports or athletic event" means a sports or athletic event offered or sponsored by, or played in connection with, a public or private institution that offers postsecondary educational services.
34 35	<b>3. Director.</b> "Director" means the director of the Gambling Control Unit within the Department of Public Safety.

1 2	<b>4.</b> License. "License" means any license applied for or issued by the director under this chapter, including, but not limited to:
3 4	A. A facility license under section 1205 to conduct sports wagering within a physical location in this State as identified in section 1205, subsection 2;
5 6 7	B. A supplier license under section 1206 to sell goods and services to be used in connection with sports wagering conducted by a facility licensee, but not to directly accept wagers;
8 9	C. A management services license under section 1207 to manage sports wagering on behalf of a facility licensee;
10 11 12	D. A mobile sports wagering license under section 1208 to permit a mobile operator to operate sports wagering through an approved mobile application or digital platform; and
13 14 15	E. An occupational license under section 1209 to be employed by a facility licensee to operate sports wagering when the employee performs duties in furtherance of or associated with the operation of sports wagering.
16 17	<b>5.</b> Mobile operator. "Mobile operator" means a mobile sports wagering licensee under subsection 4, paragraph D.

21	7. Operator. "Operator" includes a retail operator and a mobile operator.

Qualified gaming entity.</u> "Qualified gaming entity" means a gaming entity that offers sports wagering through mobile applications or digital platforms in any jurisdiction</li> </ul>

- to accept wagers. "Sports wagering" includes, but is not limited to, single-game bets,
   teaser bets, parlays, over-under, moneyline, pools, exchange wagering, in-game
   wagering, in-play bets, proposition bets and straight bets. "Sports wagering" does not
   include fantasy contests as defined in section 1101, subsection 4.
- 5 **13. Sports wagering account.** "Sports wagering account" means a financial record 6 established by an operator, or by a management services licensee on behalf of a facility 7 licensee, for an individual patron into which the patron may deposit and from which the 8 patron may withdraw funds for sports wagering and other authorized purchases, and to 9 which the operator or management services licensee may credit winnings or other 10 amounts due to that patron or authorized by that patron. A sports wagering account may 11 be established electronically through any approved mobile application or digital platform.
- 12 <u>14. Wager.</u> "Wager" means a sum of money or thing of value risked on an uncertain
   13 <u>occurrence.</u>
- 14 §1203. Powers and duties of director
- 15 **<u>1. Powers and duties.</u>** In administering and enforcing this chapter, the director:
- 16 <u>A. Has the power to regulate the conduct of sports wagering;</u>

17B. Shall examine the rules and regulations implemented in other states where sports18wagering is conducted and shall, as far as practicable, adopt a similar regulatory19structure through adoption of rules in order to maximize revenue and most effectively20combat the existing illegal sports wagering market;

21 C. May adopt rules necessary for the successful implementation, administration and enforcement of this chapter, including, but not limited to, rules governing the 22 23 acceptance of wagers on a sports event, other event or a series of sports events; 24 maximum wagers that may be accepted by an operator from any one patron on any one event; type of wagering receipts that may be used; method of issuing receipts; 25 method of accounting to be used by operators; types of records that must be kept; 26 27 type of system for wagering; protections for patrons placing wagers; and promotion of social responsibility, responsible gaming and inclusion of the statement, "If you or 28 someone you know has a gambling problem and wants help, call 1-800-GAMBLER," 29 on display at the facility licensee's property or on any mobile application or digital 30 platform used to place wagers. Rules adopted under this paragraph are routine 31 techical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A; 32

33 D. May adopt emergency rules in accordance with Title 5, section 8054;

E. Shall determine the eligibility of a person to hold or continue to hold a license, shall issue all licenses and shall maintain a record of all licenses issued under this chapter. The director may accept applications, evaluate qualifications of applicants and undertake an initial review of licenses prior to adoption of emergency rules pursuant to paragraph D;

F. Shall levy and collect all fees, civil penalties and tax on adjusted gross sports
 wagering receipts imposed by this chapter, except as otherwise provided under this
 chapter;

1 2	<u>G.</u> May sue to enforce any provision of this chapter or any rule of the director by civil action or petition for injunctive relief;
3 4	H. May hold hearings, administer oaths and issue subpoenas or subpoenas duces tecum in the manner provided by applicable law; and
5 6	I. May exercise any other powers necessary to effectuate the provisions of this chapter and the rules of the director.
7	<u>§1204. Licenses required</u>
0	1 Liconson A parson or antity may not offer accent process or solicit a sports
8 9	<b><u>1.</u></b> Licenses. A person or entity may not offer, accept, process or solicit a sports wager in this State unless all necessary licenses have been obtained in accordance with
10	this chapter and rules adopted pursuant to this chapter.
11	2. Qualifications and control. The director may not grant a license until the
12	director determines that each person that has control of the applicant meets all
13	qualifications for licensure. The following persons are considered to have control of an
14	applicant:
15	A. Each corporate holding company, parent company or subsidiary company of a
16	corporate applicant and each person that owns 10% or more of the corporate
17	applicant and that has the ability to control the activities of the corporate applicant or
18	elect a majority of the board of directors of that corporate applicant, except for a bank
19	or other licensed lending institution that holds a mortgage or other lien acquired in
20	the ordinary course of business;
21	B. Each person associated with a noncorporate applicant that directly or indirectly
22	holds a beneficial or proprietary interest in the noncorporate applicant's business
23	operation or that the director otherwise determines has the ability to control the
24	noncorporate applicant; and
25	C. Key personnel of an applicant, including any executive, employee or agent,
26	having the power to exercise significant influence over decisions concerning any part
27	of the applicant's business operation.
28	3. Application. An applicant for a license issued under this chapter shall submit an
29	application to the director in the form the director requires and submit fingerprints for a
30	criminal history background check to the national criminal history background check
31	system conducted by the Maine State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The
32	fingerprints must be furnished by all persons required to be named in the application and
33	must be accompanied by a signed authorization for the release of information by the
34	Maine State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, except that a person who has
35	submitted to a criminal history background check in this State or any other state within
36	the previous 12 months is not required to submit to another criminal history background
37	check if the person submits the results of the previous criminal history background check.
38	An applicant convicted of any disqualifying offense may not be licensed.
39	4. Material change to application. A person licensed under this chapter shall give
40	the director written notice within 30 days of any material change to any information
41	provided in the licensee's application for a license or renewal.

1 2	5. Gambling Control Unit employees prohibited. A Gambling Control Unit employee may not be an applicant for a license issued under this chapter.
3	<u>§1205. Facility license</u>
4 5	<b>1. Issue.</b> The director shall issue a facility license upon finding that the applicant meets all requirements of this section.
6 7 8	<b>2. Application.</b> In order to be eligible to receive a facility license, an applicant must also hold a license, or in the case of a beano or high-stakes beano operator, hold a license or be registered, as a:
9	A. Commercial track under section 271;
10	B. Off-track betting facility under section 275-D;
11	C. A slot machine facility or casino under section 1011; or
12	D. Beano or high-stakes beano operator under Title 17, section 312.
13 14	An applicant may not conduct sports wagering until the applicant has obtained a license required under this subsection.
15 16	<b>3. Occupational license required.</b> A facility licensee shall conduct sports wagering through persons holding a valid occupational license under section 1209.
17 18	<b><u>4. Management services permitted.</u></b> A facility licensee under this section may contract with a management services licensee under section 1207.
19 20	5. Fee. The fee for an original or renewed facility license is \$10,000 and must be retained by the director for the costs of administering this chapter.
21 22 23	<b>6.</b> License period. A license granted under this section is valid for 10 years unless sooner terminated by the director for just cause. Failure to maintain a license required under subsection 2 voids a license issued under this section.
24 25 26	7. Municipal control. Nothing in this chapter may be construed to restrict the authority of municipalities under municipal home rule provisions of the Constitution of Maine, including zoning and public safety authority.
27	<u>§1206. Supplier license</u>
28 29	<b>1. Issue.</b> The director shall issue a supplier license upon finding that the applicant meets all requirements of this section.
30 31 32 33 34 35	<b>2. Equipment.</b> An applicant for a supplier license shall demonstrate that the equipment, system or services that the applicant plans to offer to a facility licensee conform to standards established by the director and applicable state law. The director may accept approval by another jurisdiction that is specifically determined by the director to have similar equipment standards as evidence the applicant meets the standards established by the director and applicable state law.

**3.** Qualification; fee; renewal. An applicant for a supplier license shall meet all requirements for licensure and pay a nonrefundable application fee of \$1,000. The director may adopt rules establishing additional requirements for a supplier. A supplier license must be renewed annually for a licensee that continues to be in compliance with all requirements and pays the annual renewal fee of \$1,000. Fees paid under this subsection must be retained by the director for the costs of administering this chapter.

Inventory. A supplier licensee shall submit to the director a list of all sports
 wagering equipment and services sold to, delivered to or offered to a facility licensee in
 this State as required by the director, all of which must be tested and approved by an
 independent testing laboratory approved by the director. A licensee under this chapter
 may continue to use supplies acquired from a licensed sports wagering supplier even if a
 supplier's license expires or is otherwise cancelled unless the director finds a defect in the
 supplies.

- 14 §1207. Management services license
- 15 <u>1. Issue.</u> The director shall issue a management services license upon finding that
   16 the applicant meets all requirements of this section.

17 2. Services. A management services licensee may contract with a facility licensee to
 18 manage sports wagering operations on behalf of the facility licensee in accordance with
 19 rules adopted pursuant to this chapter.

20 3. Qualification; fee; renewal. An applicant for a management services licensee 21 shall meet all requirements for licensure and pay a nonrefundable application fee of \$5,000. The director may adopt rules establishing additional requirements for a 22 management services licensee. The director may accept licensing, or authorization to 23 operate, by another jurisdiction that is specifically determined by the director to have 24 similar licensing requirements as evidenced by the applicant's meeting authorized 25 26 management services provider licensing requirements. A management services license must be renewed every 5 years for a licensee that continues to be in compliance with all 27 requirements and pays the renewal fee of \$5,000. Fees paid under this subsection must 28 29 be retained by the director for the costs of administering this chapter.

- 30 §1208. Mobile sports wagering license; temporary license; audits
- 31 <u>1. Operation upon approval.</u> A mobile operator may operate sports wagering upon
   32 <u>the approval of the director.</u>

Authority to conduct sports wagering. A mobile sports wagering license
 granted by the director pursuant to this section grants a licensee lawful authority to
 conduct sports wagering within the terms and conditions of the license and any rules
 adopted under this chapter.

- 37 3. Issuance of license. The director shall issue a mobile sports wagering license to
   38 operate sports wagering to a mobile operator that meets the requirements of this section.
- 39 4. Temporary license. A qualified gaming entity may submit a request to the
   40 director for the immediate commencement of sports wagering operations. Such a request

must include the initial license fee of \$10,000. Upon receiving a request for a temporary 1 2 license, the director shall review the request. If the director determines that the entity 3 requesting the temporary license is a qualified gaming entity, has paid the initial license fee and is in compliance with this subsection, the director shall authorize the qualified 4 gaming entity to conduct sports wagering for 2 years under a temporary license or until a 5 final determination on the mobile operator's license application is made. Sports wagering 6 conducted under authority of a temporary license must comply with the mobile operator's 7 house rules adopted pursuant to section 1211. Fees paid under this subsection must be 8 9 retained by the director for the costs of administering this chapter.

10 5. Grant of license; term. Upon application by a qualified gaming entity and payment of a \$1,000 application fee, the director shall grant a mobile sports wagering 11 license that provides for the right to conduct sports wagering if the applicant meets the 12 requirements for licensure under the provisions of this chapter and the rules adopted 13 under this chapter and pays the initial license fee of \$10,000. A license must be issued 14 15 for a 10-year period and may be renewed for 10-year periods upon payment of a \$10,000 renewal fee, as long as the mobile operator continues to meet all qualification 16 17 requirements. Fees paid under this subsection must be retained by the director for the 18 costs of administering this chapter.

6. Mobile applications and digital platforms. A mobile sports wagering license
 authorizes the operation of sports wagering through any mobile application or digital
 platforms approved by the director.

7. Expiration date and renewal. A mobile operator shall submit to the director
 such documentation or information as the director may require demonstrating that the
 mobile operator continues to meet the requirements of this chapter and rules adopted
 under this chapter. Required documentation or information must be submitted no later
 than 5 years after issuance of a mobile sports wagering license and every 5 years
 thereafter or within shorter time periods based on circumstances specified by the director.

8. Audits. Upon application for a license and annually thereafter, a mobile operator
 shall submit to the director an annual audit of the financial transactions and condition of
 the licensee's total operations prepared by a certified public accountant in accordance
 with generally accepted accounting principles and applicable federal and state laws. The
 audit must be submitted by a mobile operator by July 1st of the following year.

### 33 §1209. Occupational license

License required. A person employed by a facility licensee to be engaged
 directly in sports wagering-related activities, or otherwise conducting or operating sports
 wagering, must be licensed by the director and maintain a valid occupational license at all
 times. The director shall issue an occupational license to a person who meets the
 requirements of this section.

Authority to be employed in sports wagering. An occupational license
 authorizes the licensee to be employed by a facility licensee in the capacity designated by
 the director while the license is active. The director may establish, by rule, job

1	classifications with different requirements to recognize the extent to which a particular
2	job has the ability to affect the proper operation of sports wagering.

3. Application and fee. An applicant shall submit any required application forms
 established by the director and pay a nonrefundable application fee of \$250. The fee may
 be paid on behalf of an applicant by the facility licensee employer. Fees paid under this
 subsection must be retained by the director for the costs of administering this chapter.

A. Renewal fee and form. A licensed employee shall pay to the director an annual
 renewal fee of \$250 by December 31st of each year. The fee may be paid on behalf of the
 licensed employee by the facility licensee employer. In addition to a renewal fee, a
 licensed employee shall annually submit a renewal application on the form required by
 the director. Fees paid under this subsection must be retained by the director for the costs
 of administering this chapter.

- 13 §1210. License prohibitions
- 14 **1. Grounds for denial.** The director may not grant a license, pursuant to the 15 provisions of this chapter, if the applicant:
- 16 <u>A. Has knowingly made a false statement of a material fact to the director;</u>
- B. Has had a license revoked by any government authority responsible for regulation
   of gaming activities; or
- 19C. Has been convicted of a crime of moral turpitude, a gambling-related offense or a20theft or fraud offense or has otherwise demonstrated, either by a police record or21other satisfactory evidence, a lack of respect for law and order.
- 22 **2. Denial of license; reprimand, suspension and revocation.** The director may 23 deny a license to any applicant, reprimand any licensee or suspend or revoke a license:
- A. If the applicant or licensee has not demonstrated to the satisfaction of the director
   financial responsibility sufficient to adequately meet the requirements of the licensed
   business or proposed business;
- B. If the applicant has not disclosed the existence or identity of other persons that
   have an ownership interest in the applicant; or
- 29 C. In the case of an applicant for a facility license or mobile sports wagering license,
   30 if an applicant has not met the requirements of this section or any other provision of
   31 this chapter.
- 32 §1211. Sports wagering house rules

**1. Adoption of house rules.** An operator shall adopt comprehensive house rules for game play governing sports wagering transactions with its patrons. The rules must specify the amounts to be paid on winning wagers and the effect of schedule changes, the circumstances under which the operator will void a bet and treatment of errors, late bets and related contingencies. House rules must be approved by the director prior to implementation. 2. Posting of house rules. The house rules, together with any other information the
 director determines to be appropriate, must be included in the terms and conditions of the
 sports wagering system. Copies must be made readily available to patrons.

#### 4 §1212. Operator duties

5 **<u>1. Duties.</u>** An operator shall:

6 A. Employ a monitoring system using software to identify unusual irregularities in 7 volume or odds swings that could signal suspicious activity that requires further 8 investigation; such activity must be immediately reported to and investigated by the 9 director. System requirements and specifications must be in accordance with 10 industry standards;

11B. Promptly report to the director any facts or circumstances related to the operation12of a licensee that constitute a violation of state or federal law and promptly report any13suspicious betting over a threshold set by the operator that has been approved by the14director to the appropriate state or federal authorities;

- 15 <u>C. Conduct all sports wagering activities and functions in a manner that does not</u>
   16 pose a threat to the public health, safety or welfare of the citizens of this State;
- 17 D. Keep current in all payments and obligations to the director;
- 18 <u>E. Prevent any person from tampering with or interfering with the operation of any</u>
   19 <u>sports wagering;</u>
- F. Ensure that sports wagering occurs using only a mobile application or digital
   platform approved by the director that uses communications technology to accept
   wagers originating in this State;
- 23
   G. Maintain sufficient cash and other supplies to conduct sports wagering at all

   24
   times; and
- H. Maintain daily records showing the gross sports wagering receipts and adjusted
   gross sports wagering receipts of the licensee and timely file with the director any
   additional reports required by rule or by other provisions of this chapter.
- 28 §1213. Displaying betting limits
- An operator shall conspicuously display the minimum and maximum wagers
   permitted.

### 31 §1214. Acceptance of wagers; excluded persons

- Accepting wagers. A mobile operator may accept wagers on sports events by
   means of electronic devices. A person placing a wager must be 18 years of age or older.
- 34 2. Mobile applications and digital platforms. A mobile operator may accept
   35 wagers from a patron physically located in this State, through the patron's sports wagering
   36 account, using a mobile application or digital platform approved by the director. The
   37 branding for each mobile application or digital platform must be determined by the
   38 mobile operator.

1 **3.** Wagers with other operators. An operator may accept wagers placed by other 2 operators, and may place wagers with other operators, as long as an operator that places a 3 wager with another operator informs the operator accepting the wager that the wager is being placed by an operator and discloses the wagering operator's identity. 4 5 4. Excluded persons. The director or an operator may for good cause ban a person from participating in the play or operation of sports wagering. A log of all excluded 6 persons must be kept by the director and each operator, and a person on the director's 7 exclusion list or an operator's exclusion list may not engage in sports wagering under this 8 9 chapter. 10 5. Employees prohibited from wagering. An employee of an operator may not place a wager on any sports event through a mobile application or digital platform of that 11 12 employee's employer. 13 6. Other wagering prohibitions. An employee of an operator may not knowingly wager or be paid any prize from any wager placed with that operator or at any facility or 14 through any mobile application or digital platform outside this State that is directly or 15 16 indirectly owned or operated by that operator. 17 §1215. Sports wagering revenues; accounting for State's share of revenue imposed for privilege of offering sports wagering; limitation of other taxes 18 19 1. Imposition and rate of assessment. For the privilege of holding a mobile sports 20 wagering license or a facility license to operate sports wagering under this chapter, a tax 21 of 10% of the licensee's adjusted gross sports wagering receipts is levied on a mobile sports wagering licensee and a facility licensee. The accrual method of accounting must 22 23 be used for purposes of calculating the amount of the tax owed by the licensee. 24 2. Operator returns and payment of tax. The following provisions govern operator returns and payment of tax pursuant to subsection 1. 25 26 A. The tax levied and collected pursuant to subsection 1 is due and payable to the director in monthly installments on or before the 15th calendar day following the 27 calendar month in which the adjusted gross sports wagering receipts were received. 28 29 B. An operator shall complete and submit the return for the preceding month by 30 electronic communication to the director, on or before the 15th calendar day, in the form prescribed by the director that provides: 31 32 (1) The gross sports wagering receipts and adjusted gross sports wagering receipts during that month; 33 34 (2) The tax amount for which the operator is liable; and (3) Any additional information necessary in the computation and collection of 35 36 the tax on adjusted gross sports wagering receipts required by the director. 37 C. The tax amount shown to be due must be remitted by electronic funds transfer simultaneously with the filing of the return. 38

1 D. When adjusted gross sports wagering receipts for a month is a negative number because the winnings paid to a licensee's sports wagering patrons exceed the 2 licensee's gross sports wagering receipts, the director shall allow the licensee to carry 3 over the negative amount to returns filed for subsequent months. The negative 4 amount of adjusted gross sports wagering receipts may not be carried back to an 5 earlier month and money previously received by the director may not be refunded, 6 except if the licensee surrenders its license and the licensee's last return reported 7 8 negative adjusted gross sports wagering receipts.

9 3. No other taxes. The tax on adjusted gross sports wagering receipts imposed by
 10 this section is in lieu of all other state and local taxes and fees imposed on the operation
 11 of or the proceeds from the operation of sports wagering.

#### 12 §1216. Civil violation

Except as provided in section 1217, a person that violates the provisions of this chapter commits a civil violation for which the director may impose a fine of not more than \$5,000 for each violation, not to exceed \$50,000 for violations arising out of the same transaction or occurrence. The director may impose a fine on any person that violates this chapter and is not limited to persons licensed under this chapter.

#### 18 §1217. Crimes and penalties related to unauthorized sports wagering

- 19 1. Violation of this chapter. A person, other than a licensee under this chapter, that
   20 engages in or facilitates sports wagering commits a Class E crime and notwithstanding
   21 Title 17-A, section 1301 is subject to a fine of not more than \$10,000 and a term of
   22 imprisonment of not more than 90 days.
- 23 2. Second violation. A person convicted of a 2nd violation of subsection 1 commits
   24 a Class D crime and notwithstanding Title 17-A, section 1301 is subject to a fine of not
   25 more than \$50,000 and a term of imprisonment of not more than 6 months.

3. Third violation. A person convicted of a 3rd or subsequent violation of
 subsection 1 commits a Class C crime and notwithstanding Title 17-A, section 1301 is
 subject to a fine of not less than \$25,000 and not more than \$100,000 and a term of

31 The provisions of Title 17, chapter 62 and Title 17-A, chapter 39 do not apply to 32 sports wagering conducted in accordance with this chapter and the rules adopted pursuant 33 to this chapter.

#### SUMMARY

This bill authorizes sports wagering regulated by the Department of Public Safety, Gambling Control Unit. The bill requires a person or entity involved in sports wagering to hold a facility license, supplier license, management services license, mobile sports wagering license or occupational license. To be eligible to receive a facility license, a

person or entity must also hold a license, or in the case of a beano operator, hold a license 1 or be registered, as a commercial track, off-track betting facility, slot machine facility, 2 casino or beano operator. A mobile sports wagering license authorizes the operation of 3 sports wagering through a mobile application or digital platform approved by the 4 Gambling Control Unit. For the privilege of holding a mobile sports wagering license or 5 a facility license to operate sports wagering, the bill levies a tax of 10% of the licensee's 6 adjusted gross sports wagering receipts from the operation of sports wagering. The bill 7 allows a fantasy contest operator to offer a fantasy contest based on the performances of 8 9 participants in collegiate athletic events.
