COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 1244, L.D. 1745, Bill, "An Act Regarding the Tagging and Sale of Shellfish"

Amend the bill in section 3 in subsection 1 in the 4th and 5th lines (page 1, lines 32 and 33 in L.D.) by striking out the following: "a jurisdiction recognized by the Interstate Shellfish Sanitation Conference or successor organization" and inserting the following: 'the relevant regulatory authority recognized by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Food and Drug Administration and posted on the administration's interstate certified shellfish shippers list'

Amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or section number to read consecutively.

This amendment specifies that a shellfish sanitation certificate includes one issued by the relevant regulatory authority recognized by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Food and Drug Administration and posted on the administration's interstate certified shellfish shippers list.
