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**An Act Regarding Prior Authorization for Medication-assisted  
Treatment for Opioid Use Disorder under the MaineCare Program**

1 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:**

2 **Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §3174-EEE** is enacted to read:

3 **§3174-EEE. Prior authorization of medication-assisted treatment for opioid use**  
4 **disorder**

5 The department may not require under the MaineCare program prior authorization for  
6 medication-assisted treatment for opioid use disorder for the prescription of at least one  
7 drug for each therapeutic class of medication used in medication-assisted treatment,  
8 except that the department may not impose any prior authorization requirements on a  
9 pregnant woman for medication-assisted treatment for opioid use disorder. For the  
10 purposes of this section, "medication-assisted treatment" means an evidence-based  
11 practice that combines pharmacological interventions with substance use disorder  
12 counseling.

13 **SUMMARY**

14 This bill prohibits the Department of Health and Human Services from requiring  
15 under the MaineCare program prior authorization for medication-assisted treatment for  
16 opioid use disorder for the prescription of at least one drug for each type of medication  
17 used in medication-assisted treatment, except that the department may not require prior  
18 authorization for medication-assisted treatment for opioid use disorder for a pregnant  
19 woman.
