COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 328, L.D. 452, "An Act To Require Certain Schools To Provide Menstrual Products"

Amend the bill by inserting after the title and before the enacting clause the following:

**Mandate preamble.** This measure requires one or more local units of government to expand or modify activities so as to necessitate additional expenditures from local revenues but does not provide funding for at least 90% of those expenditures. Pursuant to the Constitution of Maine, Article IX, Section 21, 2/3 of all of the members elected to each House have determined it necessary to enact this measure.'

This amendment, which is the majority report of the committee, adds a mandate preamble.

## Fiscal Note

State Mandate - Exempted

### State Mandates

#### Required Activity

Requires all schools that serve students in grades 6 to 12 to make menstrual products available to students at no cost in all school bathrooms.

Unit Affected	Local Cost
School	Significant statewide

Pursuant to the Mandate Preamble, the two-thirds vote of all members elected to each House exempts the State from the constitutional requirement to fund 90% of the additional costs.
