COMMITTEE AMENDMENT " / " to S.P. 201, L.D. 493, "An Act To Allow Custom Slaughterhouses To Produce Cuts of Meat To Be Sold Commercially in the State"

Amend the bill by striking out the title and substituting the following:

'An Act To Increase Capacity for Slaughtering and Meat Processing in Maine'

Amend the bill by striking out everything after the enacting clause and inserting the following:

- 'Sec. 1. Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, Bureau of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources report regarding slaughtering and meat processing. The Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, Bureau of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources shall work with stakeholders to address the State's institutional capacity for animal slaughter and meat and poultry processing. The bureau shall:
- 1. Create an exploratory committee for workforce training strategies. The exploratory committee may include, but is not limited to, representatives from the Department of Labor, the Department of Corrections, the Maine Community College System and the University of Maine Cooperative Extension and meat and poultry processors. The committee shall examine workforce training strategies, including, but not limited to, a work release program, the creation of a community college curriculum and certificate program in meat cutting and train-the-trainer modules, and possible funding for mobile training and processing units;
- 2. Assess whether the State's meat and poultry inspection program staffing levels are adequate to meet increasing demand for inspection services; and
- 3. Partner with the University of Maine Cooperative Extension to increase training capacity and outreach regarding animal finishing standards and include the use of county extension agents in these efforts.

The bureau shall submit a progress report on its duties under this section to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agricultural matters no later

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than January 3, 2023. Following receipt and review of the report, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agricultural matters may submit a bill relating to the subject matter of the report to the First Regular Session of the 131st Legislature.

Sec. 2. Appropriations and allocations. The following appropriations and allocations are made.

Fiscal Detail and Notes

This bill includes ongoing appropriations of \$150,000 beginning in fiscal year 2022-23 to the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry (ACF) to underwrite a University of Maine Cooperative Extension Hazard Analysis Critical Control Point position for assisting with developing and writing food safety plans for meat and poultry processors and seafood processors. The bill also includes a one-time appropriation of \$100,000 in fiscal year 2022-23 to the ACF to support a feasibility study conducted by the University of Maine to identify financial, physical, regulatory and cultural barriers to increasing red meat and poultry slaughter and processing in the State.

The bill also directs the ACF to create an exploratory committee to work with stakeholders to address the State's institutional capacity for animal slaughter and meat and poultry processing and report progress by January 1, 2023. Additional costs to the ACF, the Department of Corrections, the Department of Labor, the Maine Community College System and the University of Maine Cooperative Extension related to serving on the exploratory committee can be absorbed within existing budgeted resources.
