Resolved: That the Task Force To Study the Coordination of Services and Expansion of Educational Programs for Young Adults with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities, referred to in this resolve as "the task force," is established to identify barriers inhibiting adults 18 years of age to 40 years of age with intellectual or developmental disabilities from being fully integrated into society and to recommend possible solutions.
7 8	Sec. 2. Membership. Resolved: That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the task force consists of 27 members as follows:
9 10	1. One member of the Senate who serves on the Joint Standing Committee on Labor and Housing, appointed by the President of the Senate;
11 12	2. One member of the House of Representatives who serves on the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
13 14	3. One member of the House of Representatives who serves on the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
15	4. The Commissioner of Education or the commissioner's designee;
16	5. The Commissioner of Health and Human Services or the commissioner's designee;
17	6. The Commissioner of Labor or the commissioner's designee;
18 19	7. One representative from the office of aging and disability services within the Department of Health and Human Services;
20 21	8. One representative from the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Child and Family Services; and
22 23 24	9. Nineteen members appointed by the Commissioner of Education, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health and Human Services and the Commissioner of Labor, as follows:
25 26	A. One member who represents an advocacy organization for young adults with disabilities;
27 28	B. One member who represents a statewide organization of parents of young adults with disabilities;
29	C. One member who represents a statewide association for adult education;
30 31	D. One member who represents a statewide association for career and technical education;
32	E. One member who represents the University of Maine System;
33	F. One member who represents the Maine Community College System;
34 35	G. One member who represents a statewide association of administrators of services for children with disabilities;
36 37	H. One member who represents community-based providers of services for young adults with disabilities;
38	I. One member who represents the Department of Transportation;
39	J. One member who represents the Maine State Housing Authority;

- 1 K. One member who represents a statewide organization that provides information and 2 resources for parents and professionals who work with families that have a family member 3 who has a disability;
- 4 L. Five members who are parents or guardians or direct care providers of a young adult 5 with a disability; and
- 6 M. Three members who are each a young adult with a disability who is eligible to 7 receive services from the State.
- 8 Sec. 3. Chair; meetings. Resolved: That the Commissioner of Education shall 9 appoint a chair of the task force and convene the initial meeting of the task force no later 10 than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The task force shall hold a 11 minimum of 4 meetings.
- 12 Sec. 4. Duties. Resolved: That the task force shall study the barriers to efficient 13 and effective services for young adults with intellectual or developmental disabilities after 14 high school and make recommendations on targeted reforms to improve the efficiency and 15 effectiveness of these services, including but not limited to:
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- 1. The coordination of services provided by different agencies; and
- 17 2. The benefits, assessments, expansion and availability of continuing educational
 18 opportunities for young adults with disabilities after high school.
- 19 The task force shall also identify the function and efficacy of current federal and state 20 mandates pertaining to young adults with intellectual or developmental disabilities and develop recommendations to enhance the coordination of programs to ensure the most 21 22 efficient and effective provision of essential services, including continuing purposeful 23 individualized education, development of self-determination and personal advocacy skills, job training, housing, development of independent living skills including management of 24 25 personal health and finances, transportation, recreation and development of social functioning. The task force shall analyze current data and retrospective data for the past 6 26 years and provide the measurable success rate of programs providing these essential 27 services, with consideration of the preferences, strengths and interests of individual young 28 adults with intellectual or development disabilities and parental concerns. 29
- 30 Sec. 5. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the Department of Education shall provide
 31 the task force with staff assistance from existing resources.
- 32 Sec. 6. Outside funding. Resolved: That the task force may seek outside funding
 33 to support the work of the task force.
- Sec. 7. Final report. Resolved: That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, no later than
 one year after the initial convening of the task force under section 3, the task force shall
 submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations for presentation to the Joint
 Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs, the Joint Standing Committee on
 Health and Human Services and the Joint Standing Committee on Labor and Housing.

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This resolve establishes the Task Force To Study the Coordination of Services and
 Expansion of Educational Programs for Young Adults with Intellectual or Developmental
 Disabilities to identify barriers inhibiting adults 18 years of age to 40 years of age with

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intellectual or developmental disabilities from being fully integrated into society and to 1 recommend possible solutions. The membership of the task force consists of Legislators 2 who serve on the joint standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over 3 education and cultural affairs, health and human services matters and labor and housing 4 matters, the Commissioner of Education, the Commissioner of Health and Human Services, 5 the Commissioner of Labor, members of organizations or associations knowledgeable 6 about services for young adults with disabilities after high school, parents or guardians or 7 direct care providers of a young adult with a disability and young adults with disabilities 8 9 who are eligible to receive services from the State. The Commissioner of Education convenes the task force, which must hold a minimum of 4 meetings and submit a report to 10 the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs, the Joint Standing 11 Committee on Health and Human Services and the Joint Standing Committee on Labor and 12 Housing with recommendations on targeted reforms to improve the efficiency and 13 14 effectiveness of services provided by different agencies and continuing educational opportunities for young adults with intellectual or developmental disabilities after high 15 school. The task force must also analyze current data and retrospective data for the past 6 16 years regarding the function and efficacy of current federal and state mandates pertaining 17 to young adults with intellectual or developmental disabilities and provide 18 19 recommendations to enhance the coordination of programs to ensure the most efficient and effective provision of essential services. 20
