1 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:**

2 **Sec. 1. 30-A MRSA §371-B, sub-§3, ¶D**, as amended by PL 2011, c. 342, §33, is
3 further amended to read:

4 D. The candidate submits written certification from the Maine Criminal Justice
5 Academy that the candidate has:

6 (1) Met the basic law enforcement training standards under Title 25, section
7 2804-C; ~~or~~

8 ~~(2) Met the basic corrections training standards under Title 25, section 2804-D;~~
9 ~~and~~

10 (3) On an annual basis, met the in-service law enforcement training standards
11 under Title 25, section 2804-E; and

12 (4) On an annual basis, met any other statutory requirement of preservice, basic or
13 in-service law enforcement training required for certification or continued
14 certification as a law enforcement officer; and

15 **Sec. 2. 30-A MRSA §371-B, sub-§4**, as amended by PL 2003, c. 510, Pt. C, §11,

17 **4. Exception.** Any person who served as a full-time law enforcement officer
18 employed by a state agency, including the University of Maine System, on or before July
19 1, 1990 or is serving in the office of sheriff on June 26, 1997 2021 or who served prior to
20 that date is deemed to meet the minimum qualifications of subsection 3.

21 **SUMMARY**

22 This bill requires a candidate for sheriff or someone serving as sheriff to have met and
23 continue to meet any statutory requirements of preservice, basic or in-service law
24 enforcement training required for certification or continued certification as a law
25 enforcement officer. This bill also provides that any person who served as a full-time law
26 enforcement officer employed by a state agency, including the University of Maine System,
27 on or before July 1, 1990 is considered to have met the standards required by this bill.
