Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not 15 become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and 16 Whereas, individuals' privacy and security are jeopardized by the unregulated 17 collection, storage, use, sale, security and destruction of biometric identifiers; and 18 Whereas, the Special Committee To Protect Biometric Identifiers is needed to study 19 and make recommendations concerning the collection, storage, use, sale, security and 20 destruction of biometric identifiers; and 21 Whereas, the study must be initiated before the 90-day period expires in order that 22 the study may be completed and a report submitted in time for submission to the next 23 legislative session; and 24 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within 25 the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as 26 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 27 therefore, be it 28 Sec. 1. Special committee established. Resolved: That the Special Committee 29 To Protect Biometric Identifiers, referred to in this resolve as "the special committee," is 30 established. 31 Sec. 2. Special committee membership. Resolved: That the special committee 32 consists of 7 members appointed as follows:

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "H" to H.P. 1450, L.D. 1945

1. Three members of the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate, including members from each of the 2 parties holding the largest number of seats in the Legislature; and

2. Four members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House, including members from each of the 2 parties holding the largest number of seats in the Legislature.

Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved: That the first-named Senate member is the Senate chair and the first-named House of Representatives member is the House chair of the special committee.

Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of special committee. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have been completed. After appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the special committee. If 30 days or more after the effective date of this resolve a majority of but not all appointments have been made, the chairs may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for the special committee to meet and conduct its business.

Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the special committee shall:

Review legislation considered by the 130th Legislature concerning the privacy of
 personal information and biometric identifiers;

2. Review potential definitions of biometric identifiers, including information that is generated by measurements of an individual's unique biological characteristics, such as voiceprints and imagery of the iris, retina, fingerprint, face or hand, and that can be used to identify that individual, for use in regulating any aspect of the collection, storage, use, sale, security and destruction of biometric identifiers;

3. Review existing law of the State that applies to biometric identifiers;

4. Review how other jurisdictions regulate the collection, storage, use, sale, security
and destruction of biometric identifiers;

29 5. Review the extent to which federal laws and regulations regulate the collection,
30 storage, use, sale, security and destruction of biometric identifiers;

6. Identify the enforcement mechanisms and remedies that have been used in other jurisdictions, the extent to which they enhance compliance with state regulation of biometric identifiers and other impacts of the enforcement mechanisms and remedies;

34 7. Gather relevant information by inviting presentations from identified stakeholders,
35 which may include, but are not limited to:

- 36 A. Organizations focused on protecting private information;
- B. Public and private entities that engage in the collection, storage, use, sale, security
 and destruction of biometric identifiers;
- 39 C. Experts in personal information privacy and biometric technology;

40 D. Representatives of industries that use biometric identifiers to verify identity of those 41 seeking services, including financial institutions and health care providers;

E. Federal and state agencies that enforce laws regulating biometric identifiers; and

F. Any other source the special committee believes might provide useful information; and

8. Make recommendations regarding legislation to protect an individual's privacy with respect to the collection, storage, use, sale, security and destruction of biometric identifiers, including:

A. Defining the scope of biometric identifiers that require protection;

B. Identifying changes in state law needed in order to protect an individual's privacy with regard to biometric identifiers; and

C. Recommending remedies and enforcement mechanisms that will enhance compliance with state regulation of biometric identifiers without preventing the beneficial use of biometric identifiers.

Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the special committee, except that Legislative Council staff support is not authorized when the Legislature is in regular or special session.

Sec. 7. Report. Resolved: That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, no later than December 15, 2022, the special committee shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over judiciary matters. That committee may report out legislation related to the report to the 131st Legislature in 2023.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved.'

Amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or section number to read consecutively.

SUMMARY

This amendment replaces the bill with a resolve that establishes the 7-member Special Committee To Protect Biometric Identifiers to study and make recommendations concerning the collection, storage, use, sale, security and destruction of biometric identifiers. The special committee is required to report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over judiciary matters by December 15, 2022 and that committee may report out legislation to the 131st Legislature in 2023.

Legislative Cost/Study

The general operating expenses of this study are projected to be \$1,750 in fiscal year 2021-22 and \$2,000 in fiscal year 2022-23. The Legislature's budget for the 2022-2023 biennium includes an estimated \$6,108 in fiscal year 20 22 and \$10,000 in fiscal year 2022-23 for the costs of legislative studies, as well as \$31,260 of balances carried over from prior years for this purpose. Whether these amounts are sufficient to fund all studies will depend on the number of studies authorized by the Legislative Council and the Legislature. The additional costs of providing staffing assistance to the study during the interim can be absorbed utilizing existing budgeted staff resources.
