COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 1482, L.D. 1995, "An Act To Make Supplemental Appropriations and Allocations for the Expenditures of State Government, General Fund and Other Funds and To Change Certain Provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 2022 and June 30, 2023"

Amend the bill by inserting after the title and before the enacting clause the following:

'Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the 90-day period may not terminate until after the beginning of the next fiscal year; and

Whereas, certain obligations and expenses incident to the operation of state departments and institutions will become due and payable immediately; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,'

Amend the bill by striking out everything after the enacting clause and inserting the following:

PART A

Sec. A-1. Appropriations and allocations. The following appropriations and allocations are made.

33 **§320-K. Fund To Address PFAS Contamination**

34 **1. Definitions.** As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the
35 following terms have the following meanings.

36 A. "Advisory committee" means the Advisory Committee on the Fund To Address
37 PFAS Contamination in section 320-L.

38 B. "Agricultural land" has the same meaning as in section 32, subsection 2.

1 C. "Commercial farm" means a farm that produces any farm product with the intent
2 that the farm product be sold or otherwise disposed of to generate income.

3 D. "Farm product" has the same meaning as in section 52, subsection 3-A.

4 E. "Fund" means the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination established under
5 subsection 2.

6 F. "Perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances" or "PFAS" has the same meaning
7 as in Title 32, section 1732, subsection 5-A.

8 G. "Septage" has the same meaning as in Title 38, section 1303-C, subsection 27.

9 H. "Sludge" has the same meaning as in Title 38, section 1303-C, subsection 28-A.

10 **2. Fund established.** The Fund To Address PFAS Contamination is established
11 within the office of the commissioner as a nonlapsing account for the purposes specified in
12 this chapter.

13 **3. Sources of the fund.** The fund is funded from money accepted by the commissioner
14 or allocated or appropriated by the Legislature, including funds stipulated for deposit in the
15 fund as part of the terms of settlement of legal actions relating to PFAS contamination
16 against corporations, partnerships or individuals.

17 **4. Purposes.** Allocations from the fund may be made as determined by the department
18 upon recommendation of the advisory committee and for the following purposes:

19 A. Monitoring the health of a person, and members of that person's household, whose
20 agricultural land is found to be contaminated by PFAS;

21 B. Providing medical care to a person found to have blood levels of PFAS greater than
22 the general population or health effects associated with exposure to PFAS;

23 C. Relocating a commercial farm when the agricultural land of the farm is found to be
24 contaminated by PFAS;

25 D. Buying and selling agricultural land found to be contaminated by PFAS;

26 E. Investing in equipment, facilities and infrastructure to ensure that a commercial
27 farm with land found to be contaminated by PFAS maintains profitability while the
28 commercial farm transitions to an alternative cropping system or implements
29 remediation strategies, technological adaptations, solar development or other
30 modifications to its operations in response to PFAS contamination;

31 F. Assisting a commercial farm with land found to be contaminated by PFAS with
32 developing enterprise budgets for alternative cropping systems, remediation strategies
33 or technological adaptations or transitioning to alternative revenue streams, including
34 but not limited to land use systems combining agricultural use of the land with solar
35 energy production;

36 G. Providing short-term assistance to a person whose commercial farm is found to be
37 contaminated by PFAS, including but not limited to income replacement and mortgage
38 payments;

39 H. Evaluating the capacity of PFAS testing and data management in the State;

- 1 I. Conducting research that supports short-term farm management decisions and
2 assesses future options for viable uses of agricultural land that has been contaminated
3 with PFAS;
- 4 J. Conducting research that quantifies the impact of PFAS on commercial farms and
5 agricultural communities in the State;
- 6 K. Conducting research on soil and water remediation systems and the viability of
7 those systems for commercial farms;
- 8 L. Conducting research on alternative cropping systems, PFAS uptake of different
9 crops, the use of livestock systems to mitigate exposure to and for remediation of PFAS
10 and food safety criteria for food products;
- 11 M. Developing and implementing educational programs for landowners, including but
12 not limited to determining best practices for informing residents about the potential of
13 being near or on a site on which sludge or septage application was licensed or permitted
14 by the State prior to 2019, and providing information and guidance on buying or selling
15 agricultural lands that have had sludge or septage applied;

1 The Advisory Committee on the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination is established

4 to develop recommendations for the department, the advisory committee may form
5 working groups that include and seek input from subject matter experts from the public and

8 financial aid for farmers, research priorities, solar siting, long-term environmental

18 C. The commissioner or the commissioner's designee;

19 D. The Commissioner of Environmental Protection or the commissioner's designee;

20 E. The Commissioner of Health and Human Services or the commissioner's designee;

21 F. The dean of the Maine Agricultural and Forest Experiment Station at the University
22 of Maine, College of Natural Sciences, Forestry, and Agriculture or the dean of the
23 University of Maine Cooperative Extension, appointed by the President of the
24 University of Maine;

25 G. One member of the public representing the financial sector and with expertise in
26 agricultural finance and lending, appointed by the commissioner;

27 H. Five members of the public representing the agricultural sector, appointed by the
28 commissioner; and

29 I. One member of the public with expertise in public health, appointed by the

31 The 7 members of the public appointed by the commissioner serve on the advisory
32 committee for terms of 3 years. Members may be appointed for consecutive terms.

35 **2. Chairs.** The first-named Senate member is the Senate chair and the first-named
36 House of Representatives member is the House chair of the advisory committee.

37 **3. Reports.** The advisory committee shall hold at least 2 public hearings annually to
38 seek input from the public on efforts to meet the purposes of the fund. All proceedings of
39 the advisory committee are public proceedings within the meaning of Title 1, chapter 13,
40 subchapter 1. Notwithstanding Title 1, section 403, subsection 6, all records of proceedings
41 of the advisory committee are public and subject to the requirements of Title 1, section 403,
42 subsection 2. The advisory committee shall report to the joint standing committee of the

1 Legislature having jurisdiction over agricultural matters and the joint standing committee
2 of the Legislature having jurisdiction over environmental matters annually, beginning
3 March 1, 2023, on the input from subject matter experts under subsection 1 and members
4 of the public on issues relating to the purposes and the use of the fund. The joint standing
5 committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agricultural matters and the joint

23 transition to alternative cropping systems, remediation strategies, technological
24 adaptations, solar development or other modifications to its operations; purchasing
25 agricultural land found to be contaminated by PFAS; assisting farmers with renegotiating
26 mortgages and lines of credit; and assisting farmers whose land is found to be contaminated
27 by PFAS with purchasing of alternative land.

28 3. The department may establish, in coordination with the Department of Health and
29 Human Services, Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention, a PFAS medical
30 monitoring and blood levels of PFAS testing program for persons whose drinking water or
31 agricultural land is found to be contaminated by PFAS. If the department establishes a
32 program under this subsection, the department may not require a person to show a present
33 injury or disease to qualify for the program.

34 A. In accordance with rules adopted by the department under Title 7, section 320-K,
35 subsection 6, the program may include payment by the department for annual testing
36 of blood levels of PFAS and related services and diagnostic evaluations for an affected
37 person who does not have sufficient health coverage for testing under this paragraph
38 and related services. The program must allow the drawing of blood for the testing in a
39 health care provider's office or by a laboratory. The program must allow a blood
40 sample taken by a health care provider or laboratory to test for blood levels of PFAS

42 B. The department may develop criteria for funding medical monitoring and health
43 care for persons found to have blood levels of PFAS greater than the general population
44 and when it is medically relevant to undergo periodic medical examination and health

20 **3. Post-election audit design.** Post-election audits must be conducted on the basis of
21 statistical principles designed to limit the risk that certified election returns may produce
22 an incorrect outcome. The risk limit must be established by the Secretary of State prior to
23 each eligible election. Auditors shall visually examine each original, paper ballot selected
24 for the audit and shall review the records documenting the chain of custody and secure
25 storage of ballots as well as any additional documents identified by the Secretary of State
26 by rule.

27 **4. Selection of elections to be audited.** Eligible elections to be audited must be
28 selected in accordance with criteria established by the Secretary of State by rule.

29 **5. Public proceeding.** A post-election audit is a public proceeding as defined in Title
30 1, section 402, subsection 2. Notwithstanding Title 1, section 403, the Secretary of State
31 may limit the number of members of the public and representatives of the media who may
32 attend if there is insufficient space and the presence of additional individuals would
33 interfere with the conduct of the post-election audit. The public notice required by Title 1,
34 section 406 must be provided at least 24 hours prior to the commencement of the post-
35 election audit.

36 **6. Partisan political activities prohibited.** Staff in the Department of the Secretary
37 of State who conduct a post-election audit pursuant to this section may not engage in
38 partisan political activities that create an appearance of partiality with regard to an election
39 administered by the department, including but not limited to making a contribution to a
40 campaign, serving on a political action committee or campaign committee or soliciting
41 votes in support of or in opposition to an issue or candidate appearing on a ballot.

28 **1. Eligibility expansion and rate adjustments.** The Department of Health and
29 Human Services shall prioritize eligibility expansion under rule Chapter 101: MaineCare
30 Benefits Manual, Chapter II, Section 93, Opioid Health Home Services, and the
31 implementation of rate adjustments recommended in rate studies for the following:

- 32 A. Home and community treatment and outpatient therapy under rule Chapter 101:
33 MaineCare Benefits Manual, Chapter III, Section 65, Behavioral Health Services;
34 B. Assertive community treatment; and
35 C. Targeted case management.

36 **2. Excess money.** The Department of Health and Human Services shall use money in
37 excess of the amount needed to implement changes for eligibility expansion and rate
38 adjustments for services prioritized under subsection 1 to implement other eligibility
39 expansion or rate increases based on rate studies for other services in rule Chapter 101:
40 MaineCare Benefits Manual, Chapter II, Sections 17, 28, 65 and 92 and behavioral health
41 services delivered in schools, with priority given to crisis services.

1 without qualifying children and from 12% to 25% of the federal earned income tax credit
2 for all other eligible individuals.

3 **PART F**

4 This Part increases the maximum property tax fairness credit for tax years beginning
5 on or after January 1, 2022 from \$750 to \$1,000 for resident individuals under 65 years of
6 age and from \$1,200 to \$1,500 for resident individuals 65 years of age and older.

7 **PART G**

8 This Part provides an income tax deduction for payments made directly to a lender on
9 behalf of a taxpayer by a student loan repayment program funded by a nonprofit foundation
10 and administered by the Finance Authority of Maine for residents of the State employed by
11 a business located in the State. The deduction applies to tax years beginning on or after
12 January 1, 2022.

13 **PART H**

14 This Part replaces the current credit for educational opportunity with a broader and
15 simpler credit of up to \$2,500 for a qualified individual's repayment of student loans for
16 taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2022, while providing a \$25,000 lifetime
17 credit cap for each qualified individual. Unused credit carryover amounts from the credit
18 for educational opportunity in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 36, section 5217-D may
19 be claimed and applied to the new credit by a qualified individual for tax years beginning
20 before January 1, 2027, subject to the annual credit limit of \$2,500. For a qualified
21 individual whose tax liability during a taxable year beginning in 2019, 2020 or 2021 was
22 reduced by the credit for educational opportunity or who received a refundable credit based
23 on loans included in the financial aid package acquired to obtain a bachelor's degree or
24 associate degree in science, technology, engineering or mathematics, the maximum
25 allowable credit is \$3,500 for either the qualified individual's taxable year beginning in
26 2022 or 2023, whichever year is elected by the qualified individual. This Part also repeals
27 the insurance premiums tax credit for educational opportunity for tax years beginning on
28 or after January 1, 2022.

29 **PART J**

30 This Part requires the transfer of \$6,500,000 in fiscal year 2021-22 from the
31 unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Maine Military Reserve Fund to settle
32 outstanding obligations of the Maine Military Authority.

33 **PART K**

34 This Part authorizes the State Controller to transfer up to \$8,500,000 from the Reserve
35 for General Fund Operating Capital to a COVID-19 response fund. The funds may be
36 expended based on allotment established by financial order approved by the State Budget
37 Officer and the Governor. Any reimbursements received for expenses paid from these
38 funds must be returned to the Reserve for General Fund Operating Capital. Any remaining
39 balance in the COVID-19 response fund on July 1, 2023 must be transferred by the State
40 Controller to the Reserve for General Fund Operating Capital.

41 **PART L**

42 This Part creates the COVID Pandemic Relief Payment Program to provide COVID-19
43 pandemic relief payments to eligible residents of the State to help them recover from the

1 economic effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. To fund the program, this Part creates the
2 COVID Pandemic Relief Payment Program Fund Other Special Revenue Funds account
3 and transfers \$729,300,000 to the fund from the unappropriated surplus of the General
4 Fund. The fund must be used for a payment of \$850 to each eligible resident of the State.

5 **PART P**

6 This Part requires the transfer of \$3,000,000 on or before June 30, 2022 from the
7 unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Department of Agriculture, Conservation
8 and Forestry, PFAS Reserve-Bureau of Agriculture Other Special Revenue Funds account
9 to assist agricultural producers in the State that have been affected by PFAS contamination,
10 to provide support to affected farms, to support critical PFAS research and to otherwise
11 allow for the department to strategically and effectively respond to PFAS concerns and
12 issues.

13 **PART Q**

14 This Part adds the Executive Director, Office of Affordable Health Care to the list of
15 positions with salaries set by the Governor. The Office of Affordable Health Care was
16 established in Public Law 2021, chapter 459, "An Act To Lower Health Care Costs through
17 the Establishment of the Office of Affordable Health Care." Positions and funding for the
18 office were created in Public Law 2021, chapter 484, "An Act To Clarify Funding for the
19 Office of Affordable Health Care." Public Law 2021, chapter 459 created the executive
20 director position and identified it as appointed but did not include it as a position with salary
21 set by the Governor.

22 **PART R**

23 This Part requires the transfer of \$750,000 on or before June 30, 2022 from the
24 unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Department of the Attorney General,
25 Victims' Compensation Fund, Other Special Revenue Funds account to support the
26 operations of the program. Revenues for the program declined during the pandemic. This
27 funding will support financial reimbursement for losses suffered by victims of violent
28 crime and their families and reimburse hospitals for sexual assault examinations.

29 **PART S**

30 This Part authorizes the Department of Corrections to transfer by financial order
31 available Personal Services balances in the Long Creek Youth Development Center
32 program, for fiscal years 2021-22 and 2022-23 only, in order to fund juvenile community
33 programs and services.

34 **PART T**

35 This Part carries forward the remaining portion of one-time funding for environmental
36 closure activity costs at the former Maine Military Authority site in Limestone appropriated
37 in Public Law 2021, chapter 398.

38 **PART U**

39 This Part establishes the Housing Opportunity Program within the Department of
40 Economic and Community Development to encourage and support the development of
41 additional housing units in the State, including housing units that are affordable to low-
42 income and moderate-income individuals and housing units targeted to community
43 workforce housing needs.

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PART V

This Part requires the transfer of \$970,100 in fiscal year 2021-22 from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Administration - Economic and Community Development program, Other Special Revenue Funds account within the Department of Economic and Community Development to cover certain operating expenses associated with the Loring Development Authority of Maine. This Part also requires quarterly reporting by the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development on disbursements made from the account and on the programs for marketing and business attraction administered by the department on behalf of the Loring Development Authority of Maine.

PART W

This Part makes the following changes to several positions in the Department of Education:

1. The title of Director, Legislative Affairs is changed to Director of Policy and Government Affairs;
2. The Chief Innovation Officer is removed from the list of major policy-influencing positions, and the Associate Commissioner of Policy and Programs and the Associate Commissioner of Public Education are added as major policy-influencing positions; and
3. The Chief Innovation Officer and Chief of Staff and Operations are removed from the list of positions appointed by the Commissioner of Education, and the Associate Commissioner of Policy and Programs and the Associate Commissioner of Public Education are added as appointed positions.

PART X

This Part changes the authority to issue securities for equipment purchases for career and technical education centers and career and technical education regions from the Maine Governmental Facilities Authority to the Maine Municipal Bond Bank. The ability to access funds through this mechanism provides a limited alternative for career and technical education centers and regions to fund equipment purchases to better serve the State's students.

PART Y

This Part creates the Education Stabilization Fund and requires the transfer of balances from the fund to the Department of Education for essential programs and services payments. The fund provides resources to maintain budgeted levels of funding for essential programs and services should there otherwise be insufficient General Fund appropriations or any other shortage of funds.

PART Z

This Part requires the transfer of \$3,500,000 on or before June 30, 2022 from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Efficiency Maine Trust, Other Special Revenue Funds account to support electric vehicle rebate programs, including incentive programs.

PART AA

1 This Part directs the State Controller to transfer \$3,200,000 on or before June 30, 2022
2 from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Department of Environmental
3 Protection, Uncontrolled Sites Fund, Other Special Revenue Funds account to assist
4 laboratories in the State with equipment purchases and ancillary services, including, but
5 not limited to, staffing costs and laboratory certification costs, that will increase capacity
6 for sample testing and analysis of perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances and
7 authorizes the department to spend those funds only for that purpose.

8 **PART CC**

9 This Part amends the law governing the nursing education loan repayment program by
10 changing the required program commitment period from a minimum of 5 years to a
11 minimum of 3 years and by making any program rules adopted routine technical rules
12 instead of major substantive rules. This Part also extends the termination date of the Maine
13 Health Care Provider Loan Repayment Pilot Program.

14 **PART EE**

15 This Part repeals the language associated with the consolidation of MaineCare-related
16 programs and accounts approved in Public Law 2021, chapter 398.

17 **PART FF**

18 This Part:

19 1. Requires the Department of Health and Human Services to notify the joint standing
20 committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs
21 and health and human services matters each time the department plans to transfer or expend
22 any amount from the MaineCare Stabilization Fund or otherwise affect the balance in the
23 fund;

24 2. Requires, whenever a proposal in a resolve or bill before the Legislature, including
25 but not limited to a budget bill, affects the MaineCare Stabilization Fund, the joint standing
26 committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over the proposal to hold a public hearing
27 and determine the level of support for the proposal among members of that committee and,
28 if there is support among a majority of the members of the committee, to request the joint
29 standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services
30 matters to review and evaluate the proposal as it pertains to the fund; and

31 3. Repeals Public Law 2019, chapter 343, Part BBBB, section 3, which authorized the
32 transfer of up to \$29,000,000 from the MaineCare Stabilization Fund for MaineCare
33 payments, and Public Law 2021, chapter 398, Part WW, section 2, which authorized the
34 transfer from the balance available in the MaineCare Stabilization Fund for MaineCare
35 payments.

36 **PART GG**

37 This Part authorizes the Department of Health and Human Services to transfer savings
38 incurred from the increase in the Federal Medical Assistance Percentage per the federal
39 American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Public Law 117-2, Section 9817 from various General
40 Fund MaineCare program accounts to Other Special Revenue Funds accounts in the
41 Medical Care - Payments to Providers program and the Office of MaineCare Services
42 program to be used for federally authorized purposes.

43 **PART HH**

1 This Part allows the Department of Health and Human Services to carry forward any
2 unexpended balance of the \$1,335,770 in the Food Supplement Administration program
3 appropriated in Public Law 2021, chapter 1 to meet reinvestment obligations for penalties
4 incurred in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program in 2019.

5 **PART II**

6 This Part transfers funds from the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife Carrying Balances -
7 General Fund account to the Resource Management Services - Inland Fisheries and
8 Wildlife program, General Fund account in fiscal year 2022-23 to provide matching funds
9 for the construction of the Fryeburg shooting range.

10 **PART KK**

11 This Part reestablishes the Commission To Develop a Paid Family and Medical Leave
12 Benefits Program, which was established in Resolve 2021, chapter 122, and requires the
13 commission to submit a report for presentation to the First Regular Session of the 131st
14 Legislature no later than November 2, 2022. It provides that funds appropriated or
15 allocated pursuant to Resolve 2021, chapter 122 do not lapse but must be carried forward
16 into the next fiscal year to be used for the purpose for which the funds were provided. It
17 requires the appointing authorities, to the greatest extent practicable, to reappoint the
18 persons they appointed to the former commission.

19 The Part requires the transfer of \$300,000 in fiscal year 2021-22 from the
20 unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Legislature, Study Commissions -
21 Funding Other Special Revenue Funds account to support the costs of contracting with an
22 outside entity to conduct and complete an actuarial study as required for the commission.

23 **PART LL**

24 This Part requires the transfer of \$200,000 in fiscal year 2021-22 from the
25 unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Imagination Library of Maine Fund,
26 Other Special Revenue Funds account within the Maine State Library. The transfer
27 provides funding for the creation of the Imagination Library of Maine Fund with a goal to
28 promote and encourage reading by children of this State and to develop a statewide
29 initiative to provide age-appropriate books to children from birth to 5 years of age at their
30 homes on a monthly basis.

31 **PART MM**

32 This Part provides that the entire amount of any borrowing by the Maine Maritime
33 Academy for which at least part of the related debt service will be funded by a commitment
34 from the Legislature is excluded from the total amount limitation that applies to borrowing
35 by the academy.

36 **PART NN**

37 This Part provides for an additional cost-of-living increase of 1.0% of the established
38 2021 maximum benefit subject to an increase and establishes the 2022 maximum benefit
39 subject to a cost-of-living increase as \$24,186.25 for retirees from the state-sponsored
40 retirement plans. This Part requires the State Controller to transfer \$104,789,515 from the
41 unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Retirement Allowance Fund within the
42 Maine Public Employees Retirement System no later than June 30, 2022 to fund the
43 provisions.

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PART OO

This Part requires the transfer of \$20,000,000 in fiscal year 2021-22 from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Maine Community College System Free Community College - 2 Enrollment Years program, Other Special Revenue Funds account. The funds will be used to provide 2 years of free community college for eligible students who graduate from high school in the classes of 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023 or persons who obtain the equivalent of a high school diploma in 2020, 2021, 2022 or 2023, enroll in a Maine community college on a full-time basis, matriculate toward a degree or academic credential, live in the State and accept all other sources of funding. This Part also requires the Maine Community College System to report to the Governor and the Legislature on the use and success of the program.

PART PP

This Part requires a one-time transfer from the General Fund unappropriated surplus in fiscal year 2021-22 to the Highway and Bridge Capital, Other Special Revenue Funds account within the Department of Transportation to support highway and bridge projects.

PART QQ

This Part adds the Director of Operations as a major policy-influencing position within the Department of Administrative and Financial Services.

PART RR

This Part directs the Department of Health and Human Services to implement a system of salary supplements for child care providers and early childhood educators.

PART TT

This Part authorizes the judicial branch to use funds from securities issued by the Maine Governmental Facilities Authority to replace and upgrade ventilation systems in facilities relating to the judicial branch in Presque Isle, Lewiston, Rockland, Skowhegan and West Bath.

PART UU

This Part requires the transfer of \$3,000,000 on or before June 30, 2022 from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Department of Marine Resources, Bureau of Policy and Management, Lobster Fisheries Litigation Fund, Other Special Revenue Funds account to support litigation costs in defense of the State's lobster fishery. The department may use the one-time transfer to support the increase in legal services related to pending litigation in federal court regarding the protection of right whales and the authorization of the Maine lobster fishery by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, including supporting the department's intervenor status in 2 active cases. These funds will also ensure that the department has the resources in the event of other related cases that could be filed against the lobster fishery or the need to appeal any adverse decision. Any unused funds revert back to the Maine Budget Stabilization Fund on July 1, 2032.

PART VV

This Part allows the Treasurer of State and the State Controller to establish certain payment procedures through routine technical rules rather than major substantive rules.

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PART WW

This Part establishes the Emergency Housing Relief Fund Program within the Maine State Housing Authority and requires the transfer of \$22,000,000 on or before June 30, 2023 from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Maine State Housing Authority, Emergency Housing Relief Fund, Other Special Revenue Funds account. The funds may be used to provide rental assistance, supplement or create other programs addressing the needs of people experiencing homelessness or facing other immediate housing needs, supplement other short-term rental assistance programs, create supportive housing for people with disabilities, mental health challenges or substance use disorder using an approach that prioritizes providing permanent housing to people experiencing homelessness and support other uses to address housing emergencies in the State. The Maine State Housing Authority must provide quarterly reports of expenditures from the Emergency Housing Relief Fund and on the goals and achievements of the Emergency Housing Relief Fund Program to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over housing matters.

PART XX

This Part establishes the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination within the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry and the corresponding Advisory Committee on the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination to make recommendations to the department regarding administration of the fund. It authorizes the department to allocate funds upon recommendation of the advisory committee and for certain purposes, including but not limited to monitoring the health of a person, and members of that person's household, whose agricultural land is found to be contaminated by perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, or PFAS; buying and selling agricultural land found to be contaminated by PFAS; conducting research; funding for educational programs; and long-term monitoring of contaminated sites and establishing a corresponding centralized data repository.

This Part also authorizes the advisory committee to form working groups that include and seek input from subject matter experts from the public and private sectors to deliberate issues relating to the purposes of the fund, including but not limited to health monitoring, short-term financial aid for farmers, research priorities, solar siting, long-term environmental monitoring and land acquisition. It also requires the advisory committee to hold at least 2 public hearings annually to seek input from the public on efforts to meet the purposes of the fund. The advisory committee is required to submit a report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agricultural matters and the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over environmental matters annually on input from subject matter experts and members of the public on issues relating to purposes and uses of the fund.

This Part directs the department to develop and implement an initial plan that prioritizes funding and a long-term plan for the administration of the funds.

This Part requires the department to submit an annual report to the Legislature that includes the status of meeting the purposes of the fund, additional needs identified by the agricultural community, what funds have been disbursed and for what purpose and an update on the functional status of the advisory committee.

This Part provides one-time funding of \$60,000,000 to address PFAS contamination on agricultural land in the State.

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PART YY

This Part eliminates the Tick Laboratory and Pest Management Fund by repealing the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 7, chapter 419 and the corresponding pesticide container fee in Title 36, chapter 725. This Part also eliminates executed unallocated law directing the University of Maine at Orono to begin a study of browntail moths. This Part requires disbursement by the State Controller of the remaining funds in the Tick Laboratory and Pest Management Fund, Other Special Revenue Funds account consistent with the disbursements previously required in chapter 419.

PART ZZ

This Part requires the Secretary of State to produce and publicly disseminate a guide to election procedures, develop and conduct a training program for new municipal clerks and implement a system for collecting and logging concerns from members of the public regarding the conduct of elections.

This Part also requires the Secretary of State to design and conduct a risk-limiting pilot post-election audit after the November 2024 general election. The Part also requires the Secretary of State to conduct post-election audits beginning January 1, 2025 on eligible elections that are selected by the Secretary of State for audit according to criteria established by rule and to submit a report on the pilot post-election audit to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over elections matters by February 1, 2025.

PART AAA

This Part changes the legislative goal from ensuring that children on Medicaid have access to the same level of services as children with private dental insurance to ensuring that all children in the State with Medicaid receive at least one annual preventive dental visit. It also requires the Department of Health and Human Services to provide preventive oral health services through the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention in all schools in the State. The Part requires the department to include in its annual report on dental services to children under the MaineCare Program the status of preventive oral health services provided in schools and methods for maximization of Medicaid funding as permitted by federal law for oral health staff positions and school-based oral health services. The date of the annual report is changed from February 15th to December 31st of each year.

The Part requires the department to expand the preventive oral health services provided in schools through the school oral health program of the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention to all schools in the State on a rolling basis by January 1, 2025.

The Part also requires the department to begin a pilot project for an oral health value-based payment model within the MaineCare program that includes prevention, early intervention, disease management and care coordination services for oral health services delivered in schools and early child care settings. The pilot project must be in place by July 1, 2023 and last no less than 24 months. The department is required to submit a report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters on the results of the pilot project.

PART BBB

This Part does the following.

1 This Part continues certain limited-period positions in the Department of Labor,
2 Employment Security Services program previously continued in Public Law 2021, chapter
3 29 and Public Law 2021, chapter 398 through June 8, 2025.

4 **PART FFF**

5 This Part amends Public Law 2021, chapter 29, Part K, section 1 to increase from
6 \$20,000,000 to \$56,000,000 the amount the Maine Municipal Bond Bank must transfer in
7 fiscal year 2022-23 from the Liquor Operation Revenue Fund to the unappropriated surplus
8 of the General Fund.

9 **PART GGG**

10 This Part requires the State Controller, at the close of fiscal year 2021-22 only, to make
11 year-end transfers from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund after all transfers
12 are made pursuant to statute as follows and in order of priority: a \$35,000,000 transfer to
13 the Highway and Bridge Reserve Other Special Revenue Account, a \$15,000,000 transfer
14 to the Education Stabilization Fund and a \$3,300,000 transfer to the Disaster Recovery
15 Fund, Other Special Revenue Funds account. This Part also requires the transfer of up to
16 \$15,000,000 of the funds received from the 20% transfer of remaining funds after all fixed
17 transfers pursuant to statute and the one-time fixed transfers in this Part to the Multimodal
18 Transportation Fund, Other Special Revenue Funds account in fiscal year 2021-22 only.

19 **PART HHH**

20 This Part directs the State Controller to lapse \$159,125 from various program accounts
21 and line categories to the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to offset the cost of
22 a new position.

23 **PART III**

24 This Part provides that a certain unencumbered balance forward in the Department of
25 Health and Human Services General Fund carrying accounts, All Other line category,
26 excluding General Assistance - Reimbursement to Cities and Towns, lapses to the
27 unappropriated surplus of the General Fund no later than June 30, 2023.

28 **PART JJJ**

29 This Part requires the Department of Health and Human Services to use money
30 appropriated under Part A to pay for costs related to the implementation of behavioral
31 health rate reforms, consistent with the results of rate studies, and to expand the opioid
32 health home model to serve all MaineCare members with substance use disorder. It requires
33 the department to prioritize the implementation of certain rate adjustments. It requires the
34 department to use appropriated money in excess of the amount needed to implement the
35 prioritized rate adjustments for other eligibility expansion or rate increases based on rate
36 studies. It requires the department to submit a report to the Legislature on the timeline and
37 progress toward performing the rate studies and finalizing and implementing the rate
38 studies.
