COMMITTEE AMENDMENT " A " to S.P. 731, L.D. 2021, "An Act To Collect Pesticide Sales and Use Records for the Purpose of Providing Information to the Public "

Amend the bill by striking out everything after the enacting clause and inserting the following:

'Sec. 1. 7 MRSA §607, sub-§2, ¶B, as enacted by PL 1975, c. 382, §3, is amended to read:

B. The name of the pesticide; and information about the pesticide available to the applicant at the time of registration, including, but not limited to:

(1) The pounds of active ingredients per gallon of liquid formulations of the pesticide or pounds of desiccated pesticide applied in dry form;

(2) The brand name of the pesticide;

(3) The expected type of use of the pesticide described in a manner specified by the board; and

(4) Information on the pesticide product label that describes the acute toxicity of the formulated pesticide product or other toxicity data specified by the board;

Sec. 2. 22 MRSA §1471-G, sub-§3 is enacted to read:

3. Confidentiality. Information collected by the board under this section is public, except that the following information is confidential:

A. The name of the commercial applicator;

B. Identifying information of the commercial applicator or the business that employs the commercial applicator; and

C. The location of the application of pesticide.

Summary reports that use aggregate data that do not reveal the activities of an individual person or business are public records as defined in Title 1, section 402, subsection 3.

Sec. 3. 22 MRSA §1471-X, as enacted by PL 1997, c. 389, §2, is amended to read:

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT

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2 **§1471-X. State policy; public and private initiatives to minimize reliance on**
3 **pesticides; report**

4 It is the policy of the State to work to find ways to use the minimum amount of
5 pesticides needed to effectively control targeted pests in all areas of application. The
6 agencies of the State involved in the regulation or use of pesticides shall promote the
7 principles and the implementation of integrated pest management and other science-based
8 technology to minimize reliance on pesticides while recognizing that outbreaks of disease,
9 insects and other pests will necessitate fluctuations in pesticide use. These agencies, in
10 cooperation with private interest groups, shall work to educate pesticide users and the
11 general public in the proper use of pesticides and to determine other actions needed to
12 accomplish the state policy. The board shall submit an annual report by March 1st of each
13 year to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agriculture,
14 conservation and forestry matters, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having
15 jurisdiction over health and human services matters, the joint standing committee of the
16 Legislature having jurisdiction over environment and natural resources matters and the
17 joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over innovation,
18 development, economic advancement and business matters on developments and progress
19 made to carry out the purposes of this section.

20 **Sec. 4. 22 MRSA §1471-CC is enacted to read:**

21 **§1471-CC. Pesticide sales and use database**

22 **1. Pesticide sales and use database.** The board, in consultation with the Department
23 of Administrative and Financial Services, Office of Information Technology, shall develop
24 and administer a comprehensive online pesticide sales and use database for documenting
25 and quantifying pesticide sales, distribution and application in the State by licensed general
26 use pesticide dealers, pesticide dealers and certified applicators using information reported
27 under sections 1471-G and 1471-W.

28 **2. General use pesticide dealers and pesticide dealers.** Beginning January 1, 2023,
29 a general use pesticide dealer licensed under section 1471-W and a pesticide dealer licensed
30 under 1471-D shall maintain a record of sale or distribution of a pesticide sold or distributed
31 in this State. Beginning February 15, 2023 and every month thereafter, a general use
32 pesticide dealer and a pesticide dealer shall submit to the board's online pesticide sales and
33 use database developed under subsection 1 a report of all sales and distributions of
34 pesticides in this State made by the dealer for the preceding month.

35 **3. Applicators.** Beginning January 1, 2023, a certified applicator shall submit
36 pesticide applicator record-keeping data within 90 days after application of a pesticide
37 either to the board's online pesticide sales and use database developed under subsection 1
38 or to the board directly. The board shall enter data submitted to the board directly into the
39 online pesticide sales and use database.

40 **4. Rules.** The board shall adopt rules to carry out the purposes of this section. Rules
41 adopted pursuant to this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter
42 375, subchapter 2-A.

43 **Sec. 5. Report.** No later than February 1, 2023, the Department of Agriculture,
44 Conservation and Forestry, Board of Pesticides Control, with input from the Department
of Administrative and Financial Services, Office of Information Technology, shall submit

1 ROS a report to the joint standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over
 2 agriculture, conservation and forestry matters, health and human services matters,
 3 environment and natural resources matters and innovation, development, economic
 4 advancement and business matters on:

5 1. Progress made in developing and administering the online pesticide sales and use
 6 database pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 1471-CC; and

7 2. Recommendations for ensuring that information from a pesticide dealer or an
 8 applicator is recorded in the online pesticide sales and use database if that dealer or
 9 applicator is unable to access the Internet.

10 The joint standing committees that receive the report under this section may each report
 11 out legislation based upon the report under this section to the First Regular Session of the
 12 131st Legislature.

13 **Sec. 6. Appropriations and allocations.** The following appropriations and
 14 allocations are made.

15 Amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or section
16 number to read consecutively.

17 **SUMMARY**

18 This amendment, which is the minority report of the committee, replaces the bill and
19 directs the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, Board of Pesticides
20 Control, in consultation with the Department of Administrative and Financial Services,
21 Office of Information Technology, to develop and administer a comprehensive online
22 pesticide sales and use database for documenting and quantifying pesticide sales,
23 distribution and application in the State by licensed general use pesticide dealers, pesticide
24 dealers and certified applicators.

25 The amendment removes the requirement from the bill that commercial agricultural
26 producers maintain records relating to pesticide sales and use. Instead, the amendment
27 requires, beginning January 1, 2023, general use pesticide dealers and pesticide dealers to
28 maintain a record of sale or distribution of a pesticide. The amendment requires, beginning
29 February 15, 2023, and every month thereafter, general use pesticide dealers and pesticide
30 dealers to submit to the board's online pesticide sales and use database a report of all sales
31 and distributions of pesticides made for the preceding month. The amendment also requires
32 certified applicators to submit pesticide applicator record-keeping data within 90 days after
33 application of a pesticide either to the board's online pesticide sales and use database or to
34 the board directly.

35 The amendment requires the board to report annually to the Legislature on the
36 developments and progress made in carrying out the state policy of minimizing the use of
37 pesticides.

38 The amendment removes the requirement from the bill that the board amend its rules
39 relating to record keeping and reporting requirements.

40 The amendment removes the requirement that the board convene a series of stakeholder
41 meetings with parties required to submit sales and use reports and entities interested in sales
42 and use data to understand the types of questions to which the data might be applied.

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COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to S.P. 731, L.D. 2021 (S-526)

1 The amendment requires the board to report, no later than February 1, 2023, to the joint
2 standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agriculture, conservation
3 and forestry matters, health and human services matters, environment and natural resources
4 matters and the innovation, development, economic advancement and business matters on
5 progress made in developing and administering the online pesticide sales and use database
6 and authorizes the committees to submit legislation to the First Regular Session of the 131st
7 Legislature. The amendment also adds an appropriations and allocations section.

Fiscal Detail and Notes

This bill directs the Board of Pesticide Control (BPC) within the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry to develop and administer a comprehensive online pesticide sales and use database. The bill includes General Fund appropriations of \$416,955 in fiscal year 2022-23 for five limited-period Environmental Specialist II positions that end on June 30, 2024. It also includes ongoing General Fund appropriations of \$192,260 beginning in fiscal year 2022-23 for one Environmental Specialist III position and one Environmental Specialist IV position and \$31,500 for related All Other costs. The bill also includes one-time General Fund appropriations of \$733,000 in fiscal year 2022-23 for the development costs of a database and contracted services for data entry into the database. Beginning in fiscal year 2023-24 the BPC will require ongoing General Fund appropriations of \$50,000 for database maintenance costs and in fiscal year 2024-25 it will require ongoing General Fund appropriations of \$183,877 for two Environmental Specialist II positions. The bill includes ongoing allocations funded within the BPC of \$34,506 beginning in fiscal year 2022-23 for position technology costs and STA-CAP expenses.
