A person is guilty of disseminating obscene matter to a minor if he the person knowingly distributes, or exhibits or offers to distribute or exhibit to a minor, any obscene matter declared obscene, in an action to which he the person was a party, pursuant to subsection 3. |
| 8 9 10 11 | A. This section shall <u>does</u> not apply to any noncommercial distribution or exhibition for purely educational purposes by any library, art gallery, museum, public school, private school or institution of learning, nor to any commercial distribution or exhibition by any art gallery or museum. |
| 12 | B. It shall be is a valid defense to any proceeding under this section that: |
| 13 | (1) The defendant was a parent or guardian of the minor; |
| 14 | (2) The distribution or exhibition is exempt under paragraph A; or |
| 15 16 | (3) For motion pictures, the minor was accompanied by his the minor's spouse, parent or legal guardian. |
