Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 15 MRSA §394 is enacted to read:

1 2	collectors of firearms as curios or relics, as defined by 18 United States Code, Section 921(a)(13) as in effect on June 25, 2022, who both have in their possession a valid
3	collector of curios and relics license issued by the United States Department of Justice,
4	Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives;
5 6	B. The sale, transfer or exchange is of an antique firearm, as defined in 18 United States Code, Section 921(a)(16) as in effect on June 25, 2022;
7	C. The buyer or seller is a law enforcement agency or the Department of Corrections;
8 9	D. To the extent the buyer or seller is acting within the course of that person's employment or official duties, the person is:
10	(1) A law enforcement officer as defined by Title 17-A, section 2, subsection 17;
11	(2) A corrections officer as defined by Title 25, section 2801-A, subsection 2;
12	(3) A member of the United States Armed Forces;
13	(4) A member of the National Guard;
14	(5) A member of the Reserves of the United States Armed Forces;
15	(6) A federal law enforcement officer; or
16 17 18	(7) A person licensed as a security guard under Title 32, chapter 93 or employed by a contract security company or proprietary security organization under Title 32, chapter 93; or
19	E. The buyer and seller are family members.
20 21	5. Violations. A person who knowingly sells, transfers or exchanges a firearm in violation of this section commits:
22 23 24	A. For a sale, transfer or exchange of one or more firearms that is the person's first violation of this section, a civil violation for which a fine of not more than \$1,000 may be imposed; and
25 26 27	B. For a sale, transfer or exchange of one or more firearms when at the time of the offense the person has one or more convictions for a violation of this section or a comparable conviction under the laws of another jurisdiction, a Class D crime.
28	SUMMARY
29 30 31 32 33	This bill requires criminal background checks of buyers of firearms for private sales, transfers or exchanges at gun shows or private sales, transfers or exchanges resulting from advertising or marketing subject to certain exceptions. The bill provides that the first offense for knowingly selling, transferring or exchanging a firearm in violation of the criminal background check required by this bill is a civil violation for which the penalty is
34	a fine of up to \$1,000. The bill designates subsequent offenses as Class D crimes.
