An Act Regarding Work Requirements for Able-bodied Adults Without Dependents Under the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §3104, sub-§18 is enacted to read:
- 18. Restriction on federal waiver applications. Beginning January 1, 2024, the department may not request any waivers pursuant to 7 United States Code, Section 2015(o)(4).
 - Sec. 2. 22 MRSA §3104, sub-§19 is enacted to read:
- 19. Good-cause exemptions; limitations. Beginning January 1, 2024, any ablebodied adult without dependents must comply with federal work requirements to qualify for SNAP benefits pursuant to 7 United States Code, Section 2015(o) unless the individual qualifies for a good-cause exemption pursuant to 7 United States Code, Section 2015(o)(3). The department may not grant any additional good-cause exemptions that may be allowable under 7 United States Code, Section 2015(o)(6)(E). For purposes of this subsection, "ablebodied adult without dependents" does not include an elderly or disabled member as defined in 7 United States Code, Section 2012(j).

15 SUMMARY

This bill, beginning January 1, 2024, prohibits the Department of Health and Human Services from requesting certain waivers and exemptions under the federal Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program, or SNAP. It prohibits the department from applying for a waiver under 7 United States Code, Section 2015(o)(4), which allows for waivers in specific geographical areas that have unemployment over 10% or with insufficient jobs available. It also prohibits the department from providing exemptions to work requirements for up to 12% of individuals receiving SNAP benefits pursuant to 7 United States Code, Section 2015(o)(6)(E).
