Resolve, Directing the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry to Conduct an Accessibility Study of All Maine State Parks and Historic Sites and to Develop a Plan to Remove Access Barriers

**Preamble. Whereas,** in 2021, Maine's 48 state parks and historic sites, which are operated and maintained by the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, welcomed more than 3,300,000 visitors, who are estimated to have generated more than \$100,000,000 in revenue for Maine's economy; and

**Whereas,** Maine recently launched a \$50,000,000 initiative to rebuild Maine's state parks; and

Whereas, the federal Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 was passed over 32 years ago, and was based on congressional findings that individuals with disabilities continually encounter various forms of discrimination, including the discriminatory effects of architectural barriers and the failure to make modifications to existing facilities and practices; and

**Whereas,** Maine individuals with disabilities continue to face significant barriers in accessing Maine's state parks and historic sites; and

Whereas, the first step to ensuring that Maine's state parks and historic sites are accessible to all Maine individuals and visitors with disabilities is to conduct studies to identify access barriers and engage the disability community in the development of a plan to remediate those barriers; now, therefore, be it

- **Sec. 1. Definitions. Resolved:** That, as used in this resolve, the following terms have the following meanings.
  - A. "Historic site" has the same meaning as in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 1801, subsection 5.
  - B. "Park" has the same meaning as in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 1801, subsection 7.
- Sec. 2. Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry to conduct accessibility study on parks and historic sites. Resolved: That the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry shall conduct an accessibility study inspecting each park and historic site in the State to identify barriers to physical and program accessibility for individuals with disabilities. In conducting the study, the department shall:
  - A. Engage individuals and entities with experience and expertise in conducting accessibility studies for developed outdoor areas;
  - B. Obtain input and guidance from individuals with a wide range of disabilities; and
  - C. Use the United States Department of Justice's 2010 ADA Standards for Accessible Design and the United States Access Board's published accessibility guidelines for developed outdoor areas.
- Sec. 3. Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry to develop remediation plan. Resolved: That the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry shall develop a remediation plan based upon the accessibility study in section 2. In developing the remediation plan, the department shall obtain input and guidance in every stage of the development process from individuals with a wide range of disabilities. The remediation plan must:
  - A. List all of the barriers to physical and program accessibility identified by the accessibility study;

- B. Categorize the barriers listed in paragraph A and prioritize the barriers or categories of barriers for removal;
  - C. Provide a schedule with dates for the anticipated removal of each barrier or category of barriers; and
  - D. Include a reasonable estimate of the costs of removing each barrier or category of barriers.

**Sec. 4. Report. Resolved:** That, by December 6, 2023, the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry shall submit the plan required under section 3, along with any suggested legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry. The Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry may submit legislation based upon the report to the Second Regular Session of the 131st Legislature.

13 SUMMARY

This resolve requires the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry to conduct an accessibility study of every Maine state park and historic site to identify barriers to physical and program accessibility for individuals with disabilities and to develop a remediation plan to prioritize and remove the barriers. The department is required to submit the plan, with any recommended legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, which may submit legislation based upon the report to the Second Regular Session of the 131st Legislature.
