1           **Sec. 1. Department of Health and Human Services to amend rules for**  
2 **targeted case management services. Resolved:** That the Department of Health and  
3 Human Services shall amend its rule Chapter 101: MaineCare Benefits Manual, Chapter  
4 II, Section 13.03-4 to remove from the eligibility requirements for targeted case  
5 management services for adults with substance use disorder the provision regarding  
6 pregnancy, living with minor children and intravenous drug use. Rules adopted pursuant  
7 to this section are routine technical rules pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5,  
8 chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.
