9 10 11	COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 905, L.D. 1409, "An Act to Require Reimbursement When a Municipality Hires First Responders Whose Training Costs Were Incurred by Another Municipality"
12	Amend the bill by striking out the title and substituting the following:
13 14	'Resolve, to Establish a Task Force to Study Sharing the Costs of Training First Responders Among Governmental Entities'
15	Amend the bill by striking out everything after the title and inserting the following:
16 17	'Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
18 19	Whereas, state and local governmental entities struggle to hire and retain first responders to protect and assist Maine residents in times of emergency; and
20 21 22	Whereas, during the past 2 sessions of the Legislature, commissions have been established to study, among other matters, ways to improve the emergency services available across the State; and
23 24 25	Whereas, the Blue Ribbon Commission to Study Emergency Medical Services in the State recommended, in its January 2024 report, that the Legislature enact legislation to provide for cost sharing of training among emergency medical services entities; and
26 27 28	Whereas, the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government has unanimously voted that cost sharing among state and local governmental entities in a fair and efficient manner needs further consideration before passage into law; and
29 30	Whereas, this legislation establishes the Task Force to Study Sharing the Costs of Training First Responders Among Governmental Entities; and
31 32 33	Whereas, pursuant to the Joint Rules, the report from any legislative study committee established to conduct work after adjournment of a second regular session of the Legislature must be submitted by the first Wednesday in November; and

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Whereas, the joint standing committee unanimously voted that the period between 90 days after adjournment of this session and the first Wednesday of November is inadequate time for the Task Force to Study Sharing the Costs of Training First Responders Among Governmental Entities to address this complex matter; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

- Sec. 1. Task force established. Resolved: That the Task Force to Study Sharing the Costs of Training First Responders Among Governmental Entities, referred to in this resolve as "the task force," is established. For purposes of this resolve, "first responder" includes, but is not limited to, an individual providing fire protection services, emergency medical services and emergency dispatch services.
- Sec. 2. Task force membership. Resolved: That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the task force consists of 18 members as follows:
- 1. Two members of the Senate from the 2 parties holding the largest number of seats in the Legislature, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- 2. Two members of the House of Representatives from the 2 parties holding the largest number of seats in the Legislature, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
  - 3. Six members appointed by the President of the Senate as follows:
- A. One member representing the Maine Sheriffs' Association for county-operated public safety answering points;
- B. One member representing the Maine Ambulance Association;
- C. One member representing the Maine Fire Chiefs' Association who provides fire protection services on a volunteer basis;
  - D. One member representing the Maine Fire Chiefs' Association who provides fire protection services on a full-time basis;
  - E. One member representing the Maine County Commissioners Association; and
  - F. One member who serves in municipal or county government;
- 4. Six members appointed by the Speaker of the House as follows:
- A. One member representing the Maine Chiefs of Police Association with experience managing a dispatch center for law enforcement, fire protection or emergency medical services;
  - B. One member representing the Maine Municipal Association:
  - C. One member representing the Maine Fire Chiefs' Association who provides both fire protection services and emergency medical services;
- D. One member of a state public safety answering point designated by the Department of Public Safety;
- E. One member representing the Emergency Medical Services' Board established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 32, section 88; and

- F. One member representing Maine Emergency Medical Services established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 25, section 2901;
- 5. The State of Maine Fire Training Director within the Maine Fire Service Institute or the director's designee; and
- 6. The director of the Emergency Services Communication Bureau within the Public Utilities Commission or the director's designee.
- Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved: That the first-named Senate member is the Senate chair and the first-named House of Representatives member is the House chair of the task force.
- Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of task force. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have been completed. After appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the task force. If 30 days or more after the effective date of this resolve a majority of but not all appointments have been made, the chairs may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for the task force to meet and conduct its business.
- Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That, to determine an equitable method to provide reimbursement to a governmental entity for training and credentialing costs incurred by the governmental entity for a first responder who ends service with the governmental entity soon after receiving the training and credentialing, the task force shall:
- 1. Determine the training and credentialing required for first responders working in the State;
- 2. Determine additional training or credentialing desired for first responders working in the State;
- 3. Determine whether factors such as level of salary, travel costs, tuition costs, overtime costs, equipment costs and health screening costs should be included in the baseline calculation of costs;
- 4. Determine whether costs differ on a regional basis and whether any such differences should be factored into the calculation;
- 5. Determine if other resources are available or should be made available to reduce the burden of training and credentialing costs on a governmental entity;
- 6. Review the possible methods for sharing the training and credentialing costs of first responders among governmental entities;
- 7. Submit recommendations for an equitable approach to creating a scaled reimbursement schedule for the cost of training and credentialing an employee between governmental entities when an employee is subsequently hired by another governmental entity within a certain period of time; and
  - 8. Undertake any other activity determined necessary by a majority of the task force.
- Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the task force, except that Legislative Council staff support is not authorized when the Legislature is in regular or special session.

1 2 3 4	<b>Sec. 7. Report. Resolved:</b> That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the task force shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government no later than December 1, 2024.
5 6	Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved.'
7 8	Amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or section number to read consecutively.
9	SUMMARY
10 11 12 13 14 15 16 17	This amendment replaces the bill with a resolve that establishes a task force to study sharing training and credentialing costs for first responders among governmental entities. The task force has 18 members and is charged to determine an equitable method to provide reimbursement to a governmental entity for training and credentialing costs incurred for a first responder who ends service with the governmental entity soon after receiving the training and credentialing. The task force is required to submit a report to the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government by December 1, 2024. The amendment also adds an emergency preamble and clause. #### Legislative Cost/Study

The general operating expenses of this study are projected to be \$1,400 in fiscal year 2023-24 and \$1,650 in fiscal year 2024-25. The Legislature's budget for the 2024-2025 biennium includes \$14,500 in each of fiscal years 2023-24 and 2024-25 for the costs of legislative studies, as well as \$38,909 of balances carried over from prior years for this purpose. Whether these amounts are sufficient to fund all studies will depend on the number of studies authorized by the Legislative Council and the Legislature. The additional costs of providing staffing assistance to the study during the interim can be absorbed utilizing existing budgeted staff resources.

#### Fiscal Detail and Notes

Any additional costs to the Department of Public Safety or the Public Utilities Commission associated with serving on the task force are expected to be minor and can be absorbed within existing budgeted resources.
