12	Amend the bill by striking out the title and substituting the following:
13 14	'Resolve, to Establish the Blue Ribbon Commission to Make Recommendations on the Continuum of Long-term Care Options'
15	Amend the bill by striking out everything after the title and inserting the following:
16 17	'Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
18 19 20	Whereas, the State's system of care that serves individuals who need residential supports or long-term care is failing to meet the needs of the State's population, resulting in hospitalized patients using inpatient beds when they need lower levels of care; and
21 22 23 24	Whereas, nursing facilities, assisted living facilities and other licensed residential options that are intended to meet the needs of individuals who can no longer live safely at home are unable to provide adequate access as a result of the closure of facilities and reduced bed capacity due to financial and labor market pressures; and
25 26	Whereas, the State's laws governing residential supports have not been reviewed in over a decade; and
27 28	Whereas, immediate review of the laws governing residential supports is necessary in order to prevent more facility closures and bed capacity reduction; and
29 30 31 32	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

- **Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved:** That the Blue Ribbon Commission to Make Recommendations on the Continuum of Long-term Care Options, referred to in this resolve as "the commission," is established.
- Sec. 2. Commission membership. Resolved: That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the commission consists of 13 members as follows:
- 1. One member of the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate who serves on the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services;
- 2. One member of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives who serves on the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services;
- 3. Two members appointed by the President of the Senate who represent nursing facilities;
- 4. One member appointed by the President of the Senate who represents assisted living providers;
- 5. One member appointed by the President of the Senate who represents families with experience with the continuum of long-term care in the State;
- 6. Two members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives who represent an organization that represents hospitals;
- 7. One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives who represents an organization that advocates for issues regarding aging;
- 8. One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives who is associated with a veterans' organization;
- 9. The executive director of the long-term care ombudsman program as established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 5106, subsection 11-C or the executive director's designee;
  - 10. One member appointed by the Governor who represents the executive branch; and
- 11. One member appointed by the Governor who is a physician and who represents medical directors of long-term care facilities.
- Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved: That the Senate member appointed by the President of the Senate and the House member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives serve as chairs of the commission.
- Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of commission. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have been completed. After appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the commission. If 30 days or more after the effective date of this resolve a majority of but not all appointments have been made, the chairs may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for the commission to meet and conduct its business.
- Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall review the laws governing residential options for individuals in need of residential supports, including but not limited

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to long-term care, assisted living facilities and other licensed residential options, and make recommendations to the Legislature on changes to the State's laws in order to reflect the State's changing demographics and labor market conditions and to ensure that the State has the capacity to meet the current and future needs of individuals needing residential supports. The commission shall review:

- 1. The demographics of the State and projected need for different levels of residential supports, including but not limited to bed capacity at each level of support within a hospital service area over the next 10 years;
- 2. The needs of the State's population needing residential supports and the barriers to accessing appropriate levels of care;
- 3. Labor market conditions for residential supports, including projections over the next 10 years;
- 4. Laws governing clinical assessments and admission requirements for different levels of residential supports;
  - 5. Laws governing MaineCare coverage and payment;
- 6. Laws governing the growth of long-term care facilities, including but not limited to certificate of need requirements and so-called budget neutrality;
- 7. Laws governing home care and hospice services to ensure that the State is maximizing the use of those services; and
- 8. The role of technology to support the continuum of long-term care options for elderly individuals and recommendations for the reimbursement of providers for expenses for technology and innovation.
- **Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved:** That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission, except that Legislative Council staff support is not authorized when the Legislature is in regular or special session.
- Sec. 7. Report. Resolved: That, no later than November 6, 2024, the commission shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services. After receipt and review of the report, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters may submit legislation relating to the subject matter of the report to the 132nd Legislature in 2025.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved.'

Amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or section number to read consecutively.

#### **SUMMARY**

This amendment replaces the bill with a resolve. The amendment establishes the Blue Ribbon Commission to Make Recommendations on the Continuum of Long-term Care Options to review the laws governing residential options for individuals in need of residential supports, including but not limited to long-term care, assisted living facilities

Legislative Cost/Study

#### Legislative Cost/Study

The general operating expenses of this study are projected to be \$700 in fiscal year 2023-24 and \$950 in fiscal year 2024-25. The Legislature's budget for the 2024-2025 biennium includes \$14,500 in each of fiscal years 2023-24 and 2024-25 for the costs of legislative studies, as well as \$38,909 of balances carried over from prior years for this purpose. Whether these amounts are sufficient to fund all studies will depend on the number of studies authorized by the Legislative Council and the Legislature. The additional costs of providing staffing assistance to the study during the interim can be absorbed utilizing existing budgeted staff resources.
