Sec. 1. 7 MRSA §219-A, as enacted by PL 2021, c. 177, §1, is amended to read:

§219-A. Reusable <u>Returnable, reusable or refillable</u> containers

4 The department shall ensure that its rules, established in accordance with the 5 commissioner's rule-making authority in section 12, and guidelines neither do not preclude 6 business owners from allowing nor require business owners to allow consumers to supply 7 their own containers for the bulk purchase of shelf-stable food, beverage and nonfood 8 items. The department shall also ensure that its rules and guidelines explicitly allow a business owner to sell the business's products to consumers in the State in returnable, 9 10 reusable or refillable containers and packaging, which may be supplied by either the business or a 3rd party, in accordance with any applicable national or global standards for 11 12 health and safety. The department shall provide technical assistance and education to 13 business owners and consumers regarding best practices for the use of returnable, reusable 14 or refillable containers.

SUMMARY

16 This bill amends the food policy laws governing reusable containers, which ensure the 17 Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry's rules do not preclude business 18 owners from allowing consumers to supply their own containers for the bulk purchase of 19 shelf-stable food and nonfood items, to ensure instead that the rules do not preclude 20 business owners from allowing consumers to supply their own containers for the purchase 21 of food, beverage and nonfood items. It also requires the department to ensure that rules 22 explicitly allow a business owner to sell the business's products to consumers in the State 23 in returnable, reusable or refillable containers and packaging supplied by the business 24 owner or a 3rd party in accordance with applicable national or global health and safety 25 standards.
