An Act to Support Veterans' Organizations and Other Nonprofit Organizations and Federally Recognized Indian Tribes by Updating Electronic Gambling Laws

(AFTER DEADLINE)

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- **Sec. 1. 17 MRSA §314-A, sub-§1, ¶A,** as amended by PL 2017, c. 284, Pt. JJJJJ, §9, is further amended to read:
 - A. The Gambling Control Unit may also issue, to a federally recognized Indian tribe, licenses to sell lucky seven or other similar sealed tickets in accordance with section 324-A.
- Sec. 2. 17 MRSA §314-A, sub-§1-A, as amended by PL 2017, c. 284, Pt. JJJJJ, §10, is further amended to read:
- 1-A. Sealed tickets. The Gambling Control Unit may also accept a registration from a federally recognized Indian tribe licensed under this section to sell lucky seven or other similar sealed tickets in accordance with section 324-A, including electronic versions of lucky seven or similar sealed tickets. The licensee may operate a dispenser electronic lucky seven devices to sell the lucky seven or other similar sealed tickets. As used in this subsection, "dispenser" "electronic lucky seven device" means a mechanical or electrical device or machine that, upon the insertion of money, credit, a voucher or something of value, dispenses printed displays electronic lucky seven or other similar sealed tickets. The element of chance must be provided by the electronic ticket itself, not by the dispenser. The Gambling Control Unit may adopt rules to facilitate the use of dispensers electronic lucky seven devices. Rules adopted pursuant to this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.
- **Sec. 3. 17 MRSA §324-A, sub-§2,** ¶C, as amended by PL 2017, c. 284, Pt. JJJJJ, §25, is further amended to read:
 - C. Lucky seven or similar sealed tickets may be sold when that game of chance is registered with the Gambling Control Unit and when a valid license or registration certificate is properly displayed. Notwithstanding the other provisions of this section and section 312, lucky seven games may be conducted during the period beginning 2 hours before and ending 2 hours after a "beano" game at any time.
 - Notwithstanding any other rule, lucky seven or other similar sealed tickets may be sold that have a sale value of \$1 or less, and a person who sells or distributes "beano" cards or materials used to play "beano" prior to the conduct of "beano" as a volunteer, as provided in this section, is permitted to play in the "beano" game.
 - Sec. 4. 17 MRSA §1831, sub-§3-A is enacted to read:
- 3-A. Electronic lucky seven device. "Electronic lucky seven device" means a mechanical or electrical device or machine that, upon the insertion of money, credit, a voucher or something of value, displays electronic lucky seven or similar sealed tickets.
 - Sec. 5. 17 MRSA §1831, sub-§8-A is enacted to read:
- **8-A.** Lucky seven or similar sealed tickets. "Lucky seven or similar sealed tickets" means tickets or cards with preprinted symbols, numbers or other figures that are hidden by an opaque removable material or electronic representations of such tickets or cards that are displayed to a player using an electronic lucky seven device. Each ticket or card represents a chance to win a specific single prize or specific single set of prizes. A winning

3	SUMMARY
4	This bill updates laws related to the Department of Public Safety, Gambling Control
5	Unit's licensing and fees for selling lucky seven or similar sealed tickets to include
6	electronic versions. It also places restrictions on the number, location and operation of
7	electronic lucky seven devices and requires licensees to operate at least one kiosk for the
8	redemption of electronic lucky seven vouchers. The bill also adds definitions of "electronic
9	lucky seven device" and "lucky seven or similar sealed tickets."
10	The bill also removes the restriction that allows the sale of lucky seven or similar sealed
11	tickets only during the period beginning 2 hours before and ending 2 hours after a "beano"
12	game.
