20 21	Whereas, the safety, health and mental well-being of the residents of this State are of paramount importance; and
22 23 24 25	Whereas, the purpose of this legislation is to improve the physical and mental health of the State's residents by providing much-needed support for children and adults in the welfare system, adults with substance use disorder and children and adults with severe behavioral health diagnosis; and
26 27 28	Whereas, this legislation provides support to the State's oldest and most vulnerable adults by preventing closures of nursing facilities and preserving access to long-term care; and
29 30	Whereas, this legislation strengthens public safety, health and well-being by expanding services and coordinating violence prevention resources; and
31 32 33 34	Whereas, this legislation provides funding for infrastructure adaptation, repair and improvements that support public safety, protection of essential community assets, regional economic needs and long-term infrastructure resiliency to ameliorate some of the damage caused by recent storms; and

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Whereas, this legislation addresses educational needs for students by providing much-needed financial support for educational technicians and other school support staff; and

Whereas, the funding provided and the programs established in this legislation are needed as soon as possible; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,'

Amend the amendment in Part A by striking out all of section 2 and inserting the following:

Sec. A-2. Administration of Infrastructure Adaptation Fund program. Funds appropriated under section 4 must be administered by the Department of Transportation and must be awarded by interagency boards using competitive processes. The interagency boards shall allocate up to \$30,000,000 of the funds provided to infrastructure projects related to wharves and piers that support commercial fisheries and aquaculture businesses in this State and the remainder to projects related to noncoastal municipal, state or regionally significant infrastructure adaptation, repair and improvement projects that support public safety, protection of essential community assets, regional economic needs and long-term infrastructure resiliency. Project rating criteria may include the potential extent of public safety; emergency management and infrastructure resiliency benefits; future climate conditions; ability to leverage federal and other funding; and community, economic and environmental benefits. All projects must demonstrate increased resilience to future storm and flooding impacts. The award criteria must prioritize proposals that demonstrate a significant and compelling community benefit; recipients that are not covered by Federal Emergency Management Agency disaster funds; and recipients that demonstrate that the damage is not covered by insurance and that all emergency relief currently available has been exhausted. The administration of the funds must include sufficient documentation and record-keeping requirements to provide assurance that funds have been awarded consistent with the program guidelines and used for the intended purpose.1

Amend the amendment by inserting after Part B the following:

'PART C

Sec. C-1. Department of Health and Human Services to amend rules for targeted case management services. The Department of Health and Human Services shall amend its rule Chapter 101: MaineCare Benefits Manual, Chapter II, Section 13.03-4 to remove from the eligibility requirements for targeted case management services for adults with substance use disorder the provision regarding pregnancy, living with minor children and intravenous drug use. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are routine technical rules pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

The Department of Health and Human Services shall design and implement a community-based model of care that addresses the acute mental health needs of adolescents with co-occurring disorders. The model of care must support adolescents following discharge from residential care for substance use disorder treatment or address urgent treatment needs during times when residential care for substance use disorder treatment is not available or desired by the adolescents, the adolescent's family or the adolescent's treatment team. The model of care must include the use of the so-called assertive continuing care protocol. No later than December 3, 2026, the Department of Health and Human Services shall submit to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters a report demonstrating the efficacy of the model of care and sufficient data to aid in the development of a future MaineCare reimbursement rate.

The Department of Health and Human Services, when conducting its review of reimbursement rates paid to nursing facilities pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 3173-J, shall consider the following for inclusion in any new rates paid to nursing facilities under rule Chapter 101: MaineCare Benefits Manual, Chapter III, Section 67, Principles of Reimbursement for Nursing Facilities:
- 1. Increase the reimbursement rates to nursing facilities, other than rural nursing facilities, to provide for a supplemental allowance per patient per day that is the difference between the amount reimbursed by the MaineCare program and the MaineCare allowable costs as reported in the as-filed MaineCare 2022 cost report, as long as the supplemental allowance is no more than \$90 per patient per day. Annual inflation adjustments provided pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 1708, subsection 3, paragraph E and any one-time funding provided to nursing facilities during the COVID-19 pandemic for additional costs may not be included in the supplemental allowance. The supplemental allowance rate is cost settled against both routine and direct care components costs. For the purposes of this Part, "rural nursing facility" means a nursing facility that is not located in a Core Based Statistical Area as defined by the United States Census Bureau or that is not located within 15 miles of a critical access hospital as designated by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services;
- 2. Increase the reimbursement rates to rural nursing facilities to provide for a supplemental allowance per patient per day that is the difference between the amount reimbursed by the MaineCare program and the MaineCare allowable costs as reported in the as-filed MaineCare 2022 cost report. The supplemental allowance rate is cost settled against both routine and direct care components costs; and
- 3. Allow for education and training costs for direct care staff to be included as a cost component under the MaineCare program for:
 - A. Education and training for direct care staff for certification or recertification and for any continuing education that is considered necessary for carrying out duties by direct care staff in nursing facilities;

- 3. A high school diploma or equivalent with training and oversight as determined by the department in addition to the training provided for certification as a behavioral health professional.

In adopting rules under this section, the Department of Health and Human Services shall ensure that the training and oversight requirements for persons with a high school diploma or equivalent are consistent in both Section 28 and Section 65 of the department's rule Chapter 101: MaineCare Benefits Manual, Chapter II.

The changes to educational requirements required by this Part do not affect the requirements for behavioral health professional training and the prescribed time frames.

- Sec. K-2. Training within existing resources. The Department of Health and Human Services shall amend or establish contracts to train any number of additional individuals to become behavioral health professionals providing services for children pursuant to section 1, regardless of the setting in which the service is provided, within existing resources. The department may make any changes necessary, including choosing to charge individuals or their employers fees for training, in order to offer training within existing resources.

Costs to the General Fund and Highway Fund must be provided wholly or in part through a transfer of Personal Services appropriations within and between departments and agencies from the Salary Plan program, General Fund account in the Department of Administrative and Financial Services in an amount not to exceed \$99,000,000 in total for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2024 and June 30, 2025 up to the full amount the salary plan has accrued as of the date an agreement is reached with the respective bargaining agents to implement the economic terms of the most recent collective bargaining agreements made from July 2023 to December 2023 by with collective bargaining agents for the State and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, the Maine State Troopers Association, the Maine State Law Enforcement Association, the Maine Service Employees Association, the Fraternal Order of Police and any other certified bargaining representative for an executive branch bargaining unit, to provide equitable treatment of employees excluded from collective bargaining pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 26, section 979-A, subsection 6, paragraph F and, notwithstanding Title 26, section 979-D, subsection 1, paragraph E, subparagraph (3), to implement equitable adjustments for confidential employees.

Sec. S-3. PL 2023, c. 406, §6 is amended to read:

Sec. 6. Transfer of Personal Services appropriations between programs and departments; General Fund. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 1585 or any other provision of law to the contrary, available balances in the General Fund for Personal Services in fiscal year 2023-24 and fiscal year 2024-25 may be transferred by financial order between programs and departments within the General Fund upon recommendation of the State Budget Officer and approval of the Governor to be used for costs associated with collective bargaining agreements made with collective bargaining agents for state employees.

Sec. S-4. PL 2023, c. 406, §7 is amended to read:

Sec. 7. Transfer from Salary Plan program and special account funding. The Salary Plan program, General Fund account in the Department of Administrative and Financial Services may be made available as needed in allotment by financial order upon the recommendation of the State Budget Officer and approval of the Governor to be used for the implementation of the eollective bargaining agreements made with collective bargaining agents for state employees and for other economic items contained in this Act in fiscal year 2023-24 and fiscal year 2024-25. Prior to July 1, 2029, the department may not alter the reimbursement methods of a hospital that is reimbursed by the federal Medicare program as a prospective payment system hospital and that was reimbursed by the MaineCare program as a critical access hospital for outpatient services on or before January 1, 2024.

Sec. T-2. Prospective payment system hospital transition plans. The Department of Health and Human Services shall work with any hospital that is reimbursed by the federal Medicare program as a prospective payment system hospital and that was reimbursed by the MaineCare program as a critical access hospital for outpatient services on or before January 1, 2024 to determine a plan for transitioning to reimbursement by the MaineCare program as a critical access hospital while maintaining financial solvency. This transition plan may include but is not limited to ways in which the hospital can expand services or reduce expenses. Any hospital that is reimbursed by the federal Medicare program as a prospective payment system hospital and is reimbursed by the MaineCare program as a critical access hospital for outpatient services shall pursue federal and state provisions and programs that would improve its financial position, including but not limited to wage reclassification by the Medicare Geographic Classification Review Board. By March 31, 2029, the department shall submit to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters a report on any transition plans developed under this section.

Sec. U-1. 20-A MRSA §4016 is enacted to read:

§4016. Minimum hourly wage for educational technicians and other school support staff

- 1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
 - A. "Educational technician" has the same meaning as in section 13001-A, subsection 8.
 - B. "Other school support staff" means a public school employee who is not an educational technician and who is paid on an hourly basis.
- 2. Minimum hourly wage. Except as provided in subsection 3, for the school year starting after June 30, 2025 and for each subsequent school year, the minimum hourly wage for educational technicians is equal to 125% of the minimum hourly wage established in Title 26, section 664, subsection 1 and the minimum hourly wage for other school support staff is equal to 112.5% of the minimum hourly wage established in Title 26, section 664, subsection 1.

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for a recruitment or retention adjustment. The committee must be composed of a representative of the bureau, a representative of the employing agency or agencies and a representative of the bargaining agent, if applicable. The committee shall evaluate the request against the applicable criteria specified in paragraphs A and B and shall conduct studies as the committee considers necessary to evaluate the request. The committee shall, by majority vote, provide If the committee agrees on the appropriate adjustments, the committee shall issue to the officer, the agency and the bargaining agent, if applicable, with a report recommending and documenting adjustments authorized under this subsection. If the committee cannot agree on the appropriate adjustments, the matter must be submitted to a neutral 3rd party for a final decision and report. The neutral 3rd party may be jointly agreed upon by the officer, the agency and the bargaining agent, if applicable, or, if agreement cannot be reached, the Maine Labor Relations Board shall appoint the neutral 3rd party in accordance with the procedure outlined in Title 26, section 979-D, subsection 4, paragraph B. The officer, the agency and the bargaining agent, if applicable, shall act on this the report. If a funding request is necessary to implement an approved adjustment, the officer shall submit the cost items for inclusion in the Governor's next operating budget within 10 days after action on the report.

25 SUMMARY

This amendment amends Committee Amendment "A" to change the title and retain the transfer of \$50,000,000 from the Maine Budget Stabilization Fund, but specify that up to \$30,000,000 of the funds provided must be used for projects related to wharves and piers that support commercial fisheries and aquaculture businesses in this State, with the remainder of the funds to be used for noncoastal municipal, state or regionally significant infrastructure adaptation, repair and improvements that support public safety, protection of essential community assets, regional economic needs and long-term infrastructure resiliency.

Additionally, this amendment does the following.

Part C directs the Department of Health and Human Services to amend its rule Chapter 101: MaineCare Benefits Manual, Chapter II, Section 13.03-4 to remove from the eligibility requirements for targeted case management services for adults with substance use disorder the provision regarding pregnancy, living with minor children and intravenous drug use.

Part D requires the Department of Health and Human Services to offer grants and incentives to providers to expand into rural areas to provide services to children and adults

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in families involved in the child welfare system. It provides an appropriation of \$500,000 for this purpose.

Part E, beginning January 1, 2025, provides reimbursement for the treatment of personality disorder and other disorders associated with primary emotional dysregulation and specifies that required reimbursement for emotional dysregulation is for disorders associated with primary emotional dysregulation. This Part specifies that the reimbursement must be in accordance with the statutory language describing the MaineCare rate-setting system for development and maintenance of sustainable, efficient and value-oriented MaineCare payment models and rates and requires that reimbursed treatments are evidence-based.

Part F requires the Department of Health and Human Services to establish a contingency fund to provide supplemental assistance for children and adults with severe behavioral health diagnoses when those needs are not otherwise met by existing state or federal programs. The fund is a nonlapsing fund, and expenditures are capped at \$100,000 per fiscal year. The funds may be used to support additional staffing, enhanced reimbursement rates, physical accommodations or other identified needs. Expenditures from the fund must be used to supplement, not supplant, other departmental expenditures.

Part G provides funding to bridge the gap from federal grants to state funding for mental health organizations participating in certified community behavioral health clinic projects.

Part H directs the Department of Health and Human Services to design and implement a community-based model of care that addresses the acute mental health needs of adolescents with co-occurring disorders. It appropriates one-time funds of \$965,000 for this purpose. It directs the Department of Health and Human Services, no later than December 3, 2026, to submit to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters a report demonstrating the efficacy of the model of care and sufficient data to aid in the development of a future MaineCare reimbursement rate.

Part I requires the Department of Health and Human Services, when conducting its review of reimbursement rates paid to nursing facilities pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 3173-J, to consider the following to be included in any new rates paid to nursing facilities:

1. Providing a supplemental allowance per patient per day that is the difference between the amount reimbursed by the MaineCare program and the MaineCare allowable costs as reported in the as-filed MaineCare 2022 cost report. The amount may be no more than \$90 per patient per day for nursing facilities not including rural nursing facilities;

2. Allowing for education and training costs for direct care staff to be included as a cost component under the MaineCare program, including paying direct care staff wages while attending the education or training and paying the trainers; and

3. Establishing the separate category of rural nursing facilities for purposes of providing a supplemental allowance per patient per day.

Part I also requires the department to direct any funds appropriated for one-time supplements or extraordinary circumstance allowances for nursing facilities or private nonmedical institutions within the scope of the department's rules for increased costs and

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lost revenue due to the COVID-19 pandemic that have remained unspent to be used to create additional financial assistance opportunities for private nonmedical institutions within the scope of the department's rules.

Part J extends the date by which the Department of Health and Human Services is required to establish an income disregard for qualified Medicare beneficiaries and qualified individuals.

Part K changes the educational requirements for behavioral health professionals providing services for children, regardless of the setting in which the service is provided, to a minimum of 60 credit hours in a related field, 90 credit hours in an unrelated field or a high school diploma or equivalent with training and oversight as determined by the Department of Health and Human Services in addition to the training provided for certification as a behavioral health professional. It requires the department to amend or establish contracts for training behavioral health professionals to train any number of additional individuals within existing resources and authorizes the department to opt to charge individuals or their employers fees for training.

Part L requires the Department of Health and Human Services to establish reimbursement rates for Maine Veterans' Homes services covered by the MaineCare program. This Part requires the MaineCare program to reimburse veterans' facilities for covered services on a per resident daily rate basis that will reimburse the portion of the total MaineCare allowable cost of operating each veterans' facility attributable to the provision of services to residents who receive MaineCare benefits. This Part requires the department to index the rates to inflation annually.

Part M provides funding to strengthen and expand mental health crisis intervention mobile response services in order to provide services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It requires the Department of Health and Human Services to provide for the incorporation of specific types of mental health and crisis intervention experts into the existing crisis services response system. It also provides funding for ancillary services for mobile response services, including necessary travel and telephone conferences with clients. Part M also requires the Department of Health and Human Services, by January 30, 2025, in coordination with the Public Utilities Commission, Emergency Services Communication Bureau and the Department of Public Safety, to ensure the coordination of services under the State's E-9-1-1 system and the State's 9-8-8 mobile crisis services system. By January 30, 2026, the Department of Health and Human Services must submit a status report related to the coordination of services, including suggested legislation, to the joint standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters and utilities matters, and authorizes each of those joint standing committees to submit a bill relating to the report to the Second Regular Session of the 132nd Legislature.

Part N directs the Department of Health and Human Services to establish 2 crisis receiving centers, one in Aroostook County and one in Penobscot County, to support individuals dealing with behavioral health, mental health or substance use issues. Crisis receiving centers must provide culturally sensitive trauma-informed care. Part N also provides funding to establish the crisis receiving centers. The department is required to develop a plan to expand crisis receiving centers statewide, with at least one center located in each county.

SENATE AMENDMENT "A" to COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 1426, L.D. 2225 (S-76)

Part O establishes the Office of Violence Prevention within the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention to coordinate and promote effective efforts to reduce violence in the State, including gun violence, and related trauma and promote research regarding causes of and evidence-based responses to violence. The office is directed to increase the awareness of and educate the general public about laws and resources relating to violence prevention and conduct awareness and education campaigns. The office may establish and administer a grant program to award grants to organizations to conduct community-based violence intervention initiatives that are primarily focused on interrupting cycles of violence, trauma and retaliation by providing culturally competent intervention services. The grant program ends June 30, 2027. The office is required to create and maintain a data hub of regularly updated and accurate materials and resources as a repository for data, research and statistical information regarding violence in the State. Part O also provides funding for those purposes.

Part P provides ongoing funding to the Department of Health and Human Services for employee recruitment and retention incentives to the staff who provide medication management services provided by the Office of Behavioral Health within the department.

Part Q requires the Department of Public Safety to contract with a statewide organization with expertise in mental health for the establishment of a gun shop project for the development and dissemination of written and online suicide prevention educational materials. The department is required to submit a report by December 1, 2026 regarding the activities during the prior calendar year related to the establishment and administration of the gun shop project to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over public safety matters.

Part R requires the Commissioner of Public Safety to develop and implement procedures to notify the public, including the deaf and hard-of-hearing community, of active shooter situations and provides funding for that purpose.

Part S amends Public Law 2023, chapter 406, which funded collective bargaining agreements with executive branch employees for the fiscal years 2023-24 and 2024-25, by removing the cap on the amount that may be used to fund the Salary Plan program and instead allowing the funds to be provided pursuant to agreements with collective bargaining agents for executive branch bargaining units instead of pursuant to a collective bargaining agreement.

Part T prohibits, until July 1, 2029, the Department of Health and Human Services from altering the reimbursement method for a hospital that receives reimbursement from the federal Medicare program as a prospective payment system hospital if that hospital was reimbursed by the MaineCare program as a critical access hospital for outpatient services on or before January 1, 2024. This Part also requires the department to work with any such hospital to determine a plan for transitioning to reimbursement by the MaineCare program as a critical access hospital while maintaining financial solvency.

Part U provides that, beginning in the school year starting after June 30, 2025, the minimum hourly wage for educational technicians is 125% of the state minimum hourly wage and the minimum hourly wage for other school support staff who are paid hourly is 112.5% of the state minimum hourly wage. If the state minimum hourly wage is increased on January 1st of any year, the minimum hourly wage for educational technicians and other school support staff is increased beginning July 1st of the same year.

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SENATE AMENDMENT "A" to COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 1426, L.D. 2225 (5-701)

Part U provides that, beginning in fiscal year 2025-26 and for each subsequent fiscal year, the Commissioner of Education is required to update the salary matrix to reflect any increase in the minimum hourly wage of educational technicians and clerical staff. The Department of Education is directed to incorporate the minimum hourly wage into the essential programs and services funding model.

Part U also provides that, for the 2025-2026 school year only, the State must pay 100% of the additional funding necessary to achieve the minimum hourly wage.

Part V establishes a grant program within the Department of Education to provide grants to school administrative units that contract for behavioral and mental health services provided by licensed behavioral and mental health service providers. This Part limits the use of funds provided through the grant program to behavioral and mental health services that are not otherwise covered or reimbursable through the MaineCare program and provides that funds must be used in a manner that does not supplant qualified and available school administrative unit behavioral and mental health staff. Part V provides that the amounts of the grants must be based on a school administrative unit's population and provides ongoing funding for the grants starting in the 2nd year of the biennium.

Part W amends the recruitment and retention adjustment process for state civil service employees by:

- 1. Reducing from 4 to at least 2 the number of specified conditions that must be met to authorize payment of a recruitment and retention adjustment; and
- 2. Requiring, in the event the committee formed to determine the appropriate recruitment and retention adjustments cannot agree on the appropriate adjustment, the use of a neutral 3rd party to make a final decision.

Fiscal Detail and Notes

This amendment provides General Fund appropriations of \$63,841,544 in fiscal year 2024-25. The amendment also provides corresponding Federal Expenditures Fund, Other Special Revenue Funds and Federal Block Grant Fund allocations in fiscal year 2024-25. General Fund appropriations provided in this amendment will result in aggregate General Fund appropriations for fiscal year 2024-25 exceeding the appropriations limitation for fiscal year 2024-25 calculated pursuant to PL 2023, c. 412, Part I-6.

This amendment requires that, beginning with the school year starting after June 30, 2025, the minimum hourly wage for educational technicians is 125% of the state minimum hourly wage and the minimum hourly wage for other school support staff who are paid hourly is 112.5% of the state minimum hourly wage. The total State cost of this provision is estimated to be \$7,720,862 in fiscal year 2025-26 and \$7,952,488 in fiscal year 2026-27 and is fully funded by the State.

SA(S-70)

The amendment modifies the upper limit on transfers from the Salary Plan used to fund collective bargaining agreements. The fixed limit of \$99,000,000 established in PL 2023, c. 406 is replaced with a variable limit determined by the full amount that has accrued in the Salary Plan program, General Fund account within the Department of Administrative and Financial Services (DAFS) at the time agreements are reached. The unobligated balance in the Salary Plan is currently \$147,480,436. The amount of balances that will be available at the time agreements are reached cannot be determined at this time.

This amendment provides ongoing General Fund appropriations of \$1,353,000 per year beginning in fiscal year 2024-25 to the School and Student Supports program within the Department of Education for grants to school administrative units for contracted behavioral and mental health services for students. The grants are based on the population of each school administrative unit.

The amendment includes ongoing General Fund appropriations to DAFS of \$5,341,623 beginning in fiscal year 2024-25 for the increased costs of recruitment and retention adjustments resulting from changes to the eligibility criteria for adjustments, two additional staff positions in the Bureau of Human Resources (BHR) within DAFS to manage increased recruitment and retention initiatives and for payments to contracted mediation and arbitration services.
