Resolve, to Reestablish the Task Force on Accessibility to Appropriate Communication Methods for Deaf and Hard-ofhearing Patients

(EMERGENCY)

Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, this resolve reestablishes the Task Force on Accessibility to Appropriate Communication Methods for Deaf and Hard-of-hearing Patients to study accessibility to appropriate communication methods for deaf and hard-of-hearing patients in health care settings and how that accessibility may be improved; and

Whereas, the study must be initiated before the expiration of the 90-day period in order to provide sufficient time for the study to be completed and a report submitted in time for submission to the next legislative session; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

- **Sec. 1. Task force established. Resolved:** That the Task Force on Accessibility to Appropriate Communication Methods for Deaf and Hard-of-hearing Patients, referred to in this resolve as "the task force," is established.
- **Sec. 2. Task force membership. Resolved:** That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the task force consists of 10 members appointed as follows:
- 1. One member of the Senate who serves on the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- 2. One member of the House of Representatives who serves on the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- 3. One member of the public who is a person who is deaf or hard of hearing, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- 4. One member representing the Department of Health and Human Services, office of aging and disability services, appointed by the Commissioner of Health and Human Services;
- 5. One member representing Disability Rights Maine, appointed by the Commissioner of Health and Human Services;
- 6. One member representing the Maine Educational Center for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing and the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf, appointed by the Commissioner of Health and Human Services;
- 7. One member who is a practicing American Sign Language interpreter who has national certification as a core certification health care interpreter from the Certification Commission for Healthcare Interpreters, appointed by the Commissioner of Health and Human Services;
- 8. One member representing a hospital system with a language access plan that is considered an appropriate model for hospitals, appointed by the Commissioner of Health and Human Services;
- 9. One member representing the University of Maine System with national certification as a core certification health care interpreter from the Certification

Commission for Healthcare Interpreters and experience in American Sign Language medical interpreter training, appointed by the Commissioner of Health and Human Services; and

- 10. One member representing the Department of Labor who works with compliance issues regarding deaf and hard-of-hearing persons, appointed by the Commissioner of Labor.
- **Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved:** That the Senate member is the Senate chair and the House of Representatives member is the House chair of the task force.
- **Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of task force. Resolved:** That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have been completed. After appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the task force. If 30 days or more after the effective date of this resolve a majority of but not all appointments have been made, the chairs may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for the task force to meet and conduct its business.
- **Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved:** That the task force shall study accessibility to appropriate communication methods for deaf and hard-of-hearing patients in health care settings and how that accessibility may be improved. The task force shall consider, but is not limited to considering, the following:
 - 1. The availability of American Sign Language interpreters in health care settings;
- 2. The availability of other communication technologies in health care settings, such as video interpreters, automatically generated voice transcriptions and automatically generated captions;
- 3. Staff education and training programs on overcoming barriers to health care experienced by deaf and hard-of-hearing patients; and
- 4. Successful models for overcoming barriers to health care experienced by deaf and hard-of-hearing patients.
- **Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved:** That the Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the task force, except that Legislative Council staff support is not authorized when the Legislature is in regular or special session.
- **Sec. 7. Report. Resolved:** That, no later than November 6, 2024, the task force shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, for presentation to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters. The joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters is authorized to report out legislation related to the report to the 132nd Legislature in 2025.
- **Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved.

SUMMARY

This resolve is reported out by the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services pursuant to Resolve 2023, chapter 97. The resolve reestablishes the Task Force on Accessibility to Appropriate Communication Methods for Deaf and Hard-of-hearing Patients to study accessibility to appropriate communication methods for deaf and hard-of-hearing patients in health care settings and how that accessibility may be improved. The task force is required to submit a report and suggested legislation by November 6, 2024 to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters, which is authorized to report out legislation based on the report to the 132nd Legislature in 2025.
