STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SIXTY-EIGHT.

AN ACT to amend section two, chapter one hundred sixteen of the revised statutes in relation to the fees of trial justices and justices of the peace.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section two of chapter one hundred sixteen of the re-2 vised statutes is hereby amended so as to read as fol-3 lows:

Fees of trial justices and justices of the peace.

SECT. 2. For every blank writ of attachment and 2 summons thereon, or original summons, ten cents.

3 For every subpœna for one or more witnesses, ten4 cents.

5 For the entry of an action, or filing a complaint in

6 civil causes, including filing of papers, swearing of
7 witnesses, examining, allowing and taxing the bill of
8 costs, and entering judgment and recording the same,
9 thirty cents.

10 For the trial of an issue, eighty cents, and in case 11 more than one day is consumed in such trial, two dol-12 lars for each and every day, after the first, actually 13 employed in such trial.

14 For a copy of a record or other paper, at the rate of15 twelve cents a page.

16 For a writ of execution, fifteen cents.

17 For a recognizance to prosecute an appeal, including18 principal and surety, twenty cents.

19 For taking a deposition, affidavit, or disclosure of a 20 trustee in any cause not pending before himself, twenty 21 cents; for writing the same with the caption and for 22 the notification to the parties and witnesses, at the rate 23 of twelve cents a page; the justice who takes such 24 affidavit, deposition or disclosure, shall certify the fees 25 of himself, of the witnesses or the party disclosing, 26 and of the officer serving the notifications.

27 For taking a deposition in perpetual memory of the28 thing, the same fees as in taking other depositions.

29 For administering an oath in all cases, except on a 30 trial or examination before himself, and to qualify

31 town or parish officers, and a certificate thereof, twenty32 cents, whether administered to one or more persons at33 the same time.

For taking the acknowledgment of a deed with one
or more seals, if it is done at the same time, and certifying the same, seventeen cents.

For granting a warrant of appraisal in any case, andswearing appraisers, thirty-two cents.

39 For receiving a complaint and issuing a warrant in40 criminal cases, fifty cents.

41 For entering a complaint in a criminal prosecution,
42 swearing witnesses, rendering judgment, and recording
43 the same, examining, allowing and taxing the costs,
44 and filing the papers, seventy-five cents.

45 For recognizing persons charged with crimes for their
46 appearance at the supreme judicial court, and for cer47 tifying and returning the same with or without sure48 ties, twenty-five cents, to be paid by the person so
49 recognizing.

50 For a mittimus for the commitment of any person on 51 a criminal accusation, twenty-five cents.

52 In case of a bastardy process, the fee may be charged53 as for like services in a criminal prosecution.

54 For recognizance of debt and recording, forty-two 55 cents.

56 For drawing a rule of submission to referees, and 57 acknowledging the same, thirty-three cents.

58 For calling a meeting of any corporation, fifty cents. 59 For an examination of a debtor under the laws for 60 the relief of poor debtors, two dollars for each and 61 every day actually employed in such examination, and 62 this shall be in full payment for all official services and 63 expenses attendant upon such examination, exclusive 64 of travel.

65 For travel on any official duty, at the rate of twelve 66 cents a mile one way.

67 And in all cases where the attendance of two or more 68 justices is required, each of them shall be entitled to 69 the fees prescribed for all services rendered by him 70 personally.
