STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The town of Roxbury contains thirty-nine taxable polls. Its valuation on April 1, 1869, was about \$65,000. No wealthy persons dwell in the town. The freshet in October, 1869, injured their roads severely, and in some cases new locations are required. A committee selected to appraise the damages to the farms in said town, consisting of Hon. Timothy Walker of Rumford, William W. Wait of Dixfield, and David F. Brown of Mexico, after carefully examining the premises, reported the valuation of the town reduced one-third by the destruction of property by the freshet. The people in said town cannot repair their roads and bridges without aid from the State. It will require \$2,000 to put their roads in as good condition as they were before the freshet. The town owes a debt of nearly \$4,000 occasioned by the late war.
