STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVES in relation to the war between Prussia and France.

WHEREAS, the fratricidal contest now in progress 2 between Prussia and France, was commenced without 3 sufficient cause, regardless of the interests of either 4 people, and since the surrender at Sedan, has become 5 one of conquest and pillage on one side and struggles 6 for independence on the other; therefore,

Resolved, That as a nation the United States should 2 look upon that contest with intense solicitude, and its 3 continuance, as a direct effort against the right of a 4 people to govern themselves.

Resolved, That as a people we sympathize with the 2 Prussians as well as with the French, and admire that 3 superior intelligence which has enabled them to accom-4 plish so much as soldiers; but, we deplore the fact, 5 that they have permitted ambitious men to waste their

6 energies in a contest that is entirely incompatible with 7 the interests of both people; degrading and impoverish-8 ing one, and pillaging the other; therefore we protest 9 against its continuance, and to one people would rec-10 ommend, that they refuse to be led any longer by a 11 power that demands of them such unnecessary sacri-12 fices of liberty, life and treasure; and to the other, 13 that they never give up the contest until the invader 14 is driven from their soil.

Resolved, That such vast armies as are maintained by 2 the monarchical governments of Europe, are not only 3 entirely unnecessary, but are a standing menace to the 4 rights of the people; and we believe that the moral 5 power of the United States should be so directed as to 6 discourage their maintenance; therefore

Resolved, That the legislature of the State of Maine 2 recommend that its senators and representatives in 3 congress use their influence to urge upon congress the 4 duty of giving its moral influence in support of repub-5 lican France, and to induce the Prussians to abandon 6 a war that is inconsistent with their high standing as a 7 nation and suicidal to their best interests; and also to 8 discourage the support of standing armies all over the 9 world.
