STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-FOUR.

AN ACT amendatory of and additional to chapter fifty-one of the revised statutes concerning railroads.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECTION 1. Section thirty of chapter fifty-one of the 2 revised statutes is amended so as to read as follows: 3 Sect. 30. Every railroad corporation shall make an 4 annual report to the railroad commissioners on or be-5 fore December first, of its operations for each year 6 ending September thirtieth, to be verified by the oath 7 of its treasurer. It is to state, first, the length of the 8 road in operation, the length of single track, the length 9 of double track, the length of sidings and of spur tracks, 10 the time when laid, the length laid with steel rails, the 11 weight of rail per yard, the length laid with fished

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12 joints and of what sort, the length laid in chair joints, 13 and the length laid with Whitman's improved cross-14 ties; second, the capital stock, and the amount called 15 and paid in; third, the whole cost of the road, show-16 ing the amount expended in the purchase of lands, for 17 grading, for masonry, for bridging, for iron, for expen-18 ses of engineering, for passenger cars, for freight and 19 other cars, for locomotives, and for the total expense 20 of equipment; fourth, the amount and nature of its 21 indebtedness and its dues; fifth, the whole cost of oper-22 ating; sixth, number of passenger trains during the 23 year; seventh, number of freight trains during the 24 year; eighth, number of mixed trains during the year; 25 ninth, average number of passengers per train; tenth, 26 average number of tons of freight per train; eleventh, 27 the number of through and way passengers and rates 28 of fare; twelfth, average receipts per passenger per 29 mile; thirteenth, average receipts per ton of freight 30 per mile; fourteenth, the number of through and way 31 passengers and the rates of fare; fifteenth, the amount 32 of receipts from passengers and freight originating 33 along the line of the road; sixteenth, the amount of 34 receipts from passengers and freight brought to the 35 road by other railroads; seventeenth, the amount re-36 ceived for the transportation of passengers, of property, 37 of the mails, and from other sources; eighteenth, the

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38 number of depots, engine houses, engines and cars of 39 their several sort; nineteenth, the number of miles 40 run by passenger, freight, mixed and other trains re-41 spectively, and the average rate of speed of each; 42 twentieth, the whole number of stockholders and the 43 number who reside in this state; twenty-first, the 44 amount of each dividend and when made; twenty-45 second, the amount charged for depreciation of road 46 and other property; twenty-third, the number of per-47 sons injured in life or limb, the cause of injury, and 48 whether passengers or persons employed; twenty 49 fourth, whether any such accident arose from careless-50 ness or negligence of any person in the employ of the 51 corporation, and whether such person is retained in its 52 service; twenty-fifth, the number of employees of 53 every sort, and the average pay of each of the followconductors, baggage masters, station 54 ing grades: 55 agents, switch-men, engine drivers, firemen, brake-56 men, foremen of track sections. If any railroad com-57 pany neglects to make such report, it forfeits one 58 thousand dollars; and it shall be the duty of the at-59 torney general to prosecute for the recovery of the 60 same upon complaint thereof made to him, and the 61 same shall be published in the annual report of the 62 railroad commissioners.

SECT. 2. When in the opinion of 'the railroad com-

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2 missioners the passage of passenger trains over any 3 portion of any railroad by passenger trains would be 4 attended with imminent danger, they may notify the 5 president or superintendent of such road of such unsafe 6 condition of said portion of said road and order the 7 immediate stopping of all passenger trains about to run 8 over the same. In case said order is not obeyed said 9 commissioner shall at once apply to some judge of the 10 supreme judicial court, who may, upon satisfactory 11 proof of the necessity for such order, and without 12 notice to said company, issue an injuction prohibiting 13 the running of passenger trains over said road until 14 further order of the court.
