STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVES in favor of Arbitration and Peace.

Whereas, it is the duty of all nations to avoid by 2 every honorable means the burden and curse of 3 war, and to establish peace upon the broadest and 4 most permanent basis possible.

And, Whereas, it seems to be the settled policy 2 of the United States government to insist on the 3 insertions in its treaties with foreign governments, 4 a stipulation that controversies arising under the 5 terms of such treaties, on the failure of negotia-6 tions, shall be referred to umpires, mutually satis-7 factory, whose decision shall be final and authori-8 tative, a policy which has been already adopted by 9 several foreign governments.

Resolved, That the Senate of the United States
 should refuse to ratify any treaty which omits such
 a stipulation.

2. Resolved, That in order to render the principle 2 of arbitration permanently practical, a standing 3 High Court of Arbitration composed of persons 4 chosen by each covenanting nation, on account of 5 their peculiar fitness, ought to be constituted, to 6 which should be referred for consideration and 7 settlement those questions which have hitherto too 8 often been left to the arbitrament of war.

3. Resolved, That a convention or congress of 2 representatives from the nations, to adjust differ-3 ences of international laws and usage, ought by 4 mutual agreement to be called at some place most 5 suitable and convenient, which might also agree 6 upon the general character and powers of the 7 aforesaid court of arbitration.

4. Resolved, That the bill introduced into the 2 National House of Representatives, March 3rd, 3 1884, by the Hon. I. Newton Evans of Tennessee, 4 which provided for the calling of such a conven-5 tion at Washington by the United States govern-6 ment, meets with our approval, and we would hereby 7 respectfully memorialize and petition the Congress 8 of the United States to pass said bill, so that it 9 may speedily become a law.

5. Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions,
2 properly prepared and signed, be forwarded to each
3 of the two Houses of Congress, and also to each
4 Senator and Representative now in Congress from
5 the State of Maine.
