IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND
EIGHTY-SEVEN.

AN ACT to confer upon Trial Justices Concurrent
Jurisdiction with the Police Court of the city of
Belfast.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives
in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

SECTION 1. Trial justices shall have concurrent
2 jurisdiction with the police court of the city of
3 Belfast in all cases arising under chapter seventeen
4 of the Revised Statutes, from section one to sec-
5 tion four, inclusive; and in all cases arising under
6 chapter twenty-seven of the Revised Statutes, ex-
7 cepting section forty-eight.

SECT. 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent
2 with this act are hereby repealed.

The minority of the Committee on Legal Affairs, to which was referred the petition of David Pierce and others asking that concurrent jurisdiction be conferred upon trial justices with the Police Court of the city of Belfast in certain cases, have had the same under consideration, and ask leave to report a bill under title of "An Act to confer upon trial justices concurrent jurisdiction with the Police Court of the city of Belfast," and that it ought to pass.
