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STATE OF MAINE.

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RESOLVE in favor of Moses Goss of East Corinth.

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*Resolved,* That there be paid out of the treasury  
2 of the State to Moses Goss of East Corinth the sum  
3 of one hundred dollars for a State bounty which was  
4 due him for enlistment in Company D, Seventeenth  
5 Maine Regiment in the War of the Rebellion, and  
6 which he has never received.



### STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Moses Goss was a private in Co. D., 17th Maine Regiment, in the war of the rebellion, and served as a soldier on the quota of Charleston, Penobscot county. He went to Camp Berry, Portland, Maine, with his company, after having been accepted by the examining board at Bangor in the spring of 1865.

He was then put on guard duty, was taken sick and sent to hospital. He was soon sent home and in about two months from time of enlistment was regularly discharged as unfit for duty.

He was entitled to a State bounty of one hundred dollars which he has never received.
