STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE in favor of Congressional action on important matters.

Resolved, That the interest of agriculture is the 2 paramount interest of the State of Maine, that we 3 respectfully ask our senators and members of Con-4 gress to oppose all efforts to repeal "the oleomarga-5 rine law," so called, but on the other hand, to lend 6 their influence for such enactments, if necessary, 7 as will make it more effective to protect the honest 8 dairy productions of our State.

Resolved, That the adulteration of lard and other 10 articles of food consumption is not only injurious 11 to the morals and health of the people, but to the 12 interests of American agriculture, we heartily en-13 dorse the efforts made in Congress for "pure food

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14 legislation," and ask our senators and members of 15 Congress to aid in the passage of an enactment 16 which provides for the inspection of all slaughtered 17 animals intended for export, and for the prevention 18 of misbranding and adultering foods, liquors and 19 drugs manufactured in one State and sold in 20 another.

Resolved, That while we desire to protect every 22 legitimate and honorable business, to secure remun-23 erative profits for capital and labor, we protest 24 against unjust corners and gambling in the necessa-25 ries of life, or in any product of commerce, we also 26 condemn the existence of combinations known as 27 "Trusts," and demand the immediate action of Con-28 gress forever prohibiting such practices.

Resolved, That we approve and endorse the prin-30 ciples of the Inter-State Commerce Law in the 31 interests of transportation reform, and respectfully 32 ask our members of Congress to unite their efforts 33 to enact such wholesome provisions for its enforce-34 ment, as will be of mutual benefit to the people and 35 the railroad corporations.

Resolved, That in the adjustment of the present 37 tariff we respectfully ask our senators and members 38 of Congress to give their influence and vote for 39 that protection to agriculture, which is liberally 40 given to all other industries, to the end that wool 41 and other raw material in this country shall be 42 properly protected from foreign competition, and 43 that hay, potatoes, vegetables, eggs, beef and all 44 the products of the Maine farm shall have the 45 advantage of our home markets.
