STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE in favor of Thomas McKenney, late of Co. E, 11th Maine Regiment, a resident of Plantation No. 1, Penobscot county.

Resolved, That there be paid to Thomas McKenney of Plantation No. 1, Penobscot county, a pension of eight dollars per month as a "military pension," commencing on the first day of January 1889 to continue till such time as said Thomas McKenney shall receive a United States pension.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Thomas McKenney enlisted and was mustered into the United States service November 4th, 1861, in Company E, 11th Maine, and was discharged from hospital in the summer of 1864, sick with chronic diarrhœa, and chills and fever. Said McKenney has been in poor health ever since, and has lived nearly all the time since discharge in Plantation No. 1, Penobscot county. They have no officers in said plantation and no schools. There the man has lived and reared a family of five children, three of whom were barefoot last December (88), and with no property and no health, this man is obliged to stay.

Said McKenney was a good soldier, as reported by those who served with him. He has no education, and cannot write his name.
