STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE in favor of Limington Academy.

Resolved, That the sum of three hundred dollars
2 is hereby annually appropriated for the term of ten
3 years to Limington Academy, an institution of
4 learning located in the town of Limington in the
5 county of York; provided, however, that this
6 appropriation is made on the express conditions
7 that the trustees of said institution shall maintain
8 and keep in operation a school equal in rank and
9 grade of teaching with a first-class academy; and
10 provided further, that the governor and council
11 and superintendent of common schools shall have

12 a right at all times to visit said school when the
13 same shall be in operation, and if, in the opinion of
14 the governor and council, said institution at any
15 time hereafter shall fail to fulfil the conditions of
16 this resolve, they may, in their discretion, with-
17 hold the appropriation herein granted.

STATEMENT RESPECTING LIMINGTON ACADEMY.

The academy is located at Limington, York county. It was established in 1848 by act of incorporation. It went into operation in the spring of 1851.

It has been sustained by tuition and voluntary gifts of citizens, excepting it received early in its age about \$1000 from the sale of State lands. Its fund now is about \$700. None of its funds have been lost or misapplied. Its building is now in need of extensive repairs and of new desks and seats. It draws its scholars from Limington, Baldwin, Cornish, Hollis, Buxton, Sebago, Dayton and other towns in its vicinity. Pupils are boarded in good families for \$3.00 per week. Its tuition is low and favorable to the hard working boys and girls of its section. Common English \$3.00, higher English \$4.00, Languages, \$4.50 per term. It also furnishes first-class instruction in music, oil painting, water color and crayon, drawing and penmanship. It has two terms each year, spring and fall. It floats the national colors at every session of school.
