### STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND NINETY-ONE.

AN ACT to amend section eight of chapter twentyfour of the Revised Statutes, as amended by chapters nine and one hundred and forty-six of the public laws of 1889, relating to Dependent Soldiers and Sailors, so that said section shall apply to families of soldiers and sailors.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 8 of chapter 24 of the Revised Statutes, 2 as amended by chapters 9 and 146 of the public

- 3 laws of 1889, relating to dependent soldiers and
- 4 sailors, is amended by inserting in line eleven,

5 after the word "sailors," the following words, 'or 6 their families,' so that section 8 shall read as follows:

'Section 8. No soldier or sailor who served by 9 enlistment in the army or navy of the United 10 States in the war of eighteen hundred and sixty-11 one, and who has received an honorable discharge 12 from said service, and who has or may become 13 dependent upon any town, shall be considered a 14 pauper, or be subject to disfranchisement for that 15 cause; but the time during which said soldier or 16 sailor is so dependent shall not be included in the 17 period of residence necessary to change his settle-18 ment; and overseers of the poor shall not have 19 authority to remove to, or support in the poor-20 house, any such dependent soldier or sailor or 21 their families; but the town of his settlement shall 22 support them at his own home in the town of his 23 settlement or residence, or in such suitable place 24 other than the poor-house, as the overseers of the 25 poor of the town of his settlement may deem right 26 and proper. This section shall not be so con-27 strued as to deprive overseers of the poor of any 28 right to remove and support such dependent 29 soldier or sailor and his families in the town of his 30 settlement as herein provided.'
