STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED
AND NINETY-THREE.

AN ACT to amend Section 48 of Chapter 27 of the Revised
Statutes as amended by Section 6, Chapter 132 Public
Laws of 1891, relating to Drunkenness and Disturbance.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives
in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

Section 48 of chapter 27 of the Revised Statutes as
2 amended by section 6 of chapter 132 Public Laws of
3 1891 is hereby amended by striking out the words "is
4 quarrelsome and" in the seventh line of said section, so
5 that said section as so amended shall read as follows:

'Section 48. Any person found intoxicated in any
7 street, highway or other public place, shall be punished
8 for the first offence by a fine not exceeding ten dollars,
9 or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, and upon

10 any subsequent conviction by imprisonment for thirty
11 days. Any person found intoxicated in his own house,
12 or in any other building or place, who is disturbing the
13 public peace, or the peace of his own or any other family,
14 shall be punished for the first and any subsequent con-
15 viction, as provided in the preceding clause of this sec-
16 tion. Any such intoxicated person shall be taken into
17 custody by any sheriff, deputy sheriff, constable, marshal,
18 deputy marshal, police officer or watchman, and com-
19 mitted to the watch house or police station or restrained
20 in some other suitable place, until a complaint can be
21 made and a warrant issued against him, upon which he
22 may be arrested and tried.'
