RESOLVE in favor of Mrs. Mary Ann Sleeper.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the state treasury 2 to Mrs. Mary Ann Sieeper of Rockland a pension of ten 3 (10) dollars per month, beginning January first, eighteen 4 hundred and ninety-five.



STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Mrs. Mary Ann Sleeper is the widow of the late Jeremiah Sleeper, deceased, and is seventy-five years old, and has always lived in Rockland. About three years ago she met with an accident by which her hip joint was fractured and she has since been helpless requiring the constant care and assistance of others. She has no children living. Her only property is a small house in which she resides.

Her son, Otis Hamilton Sleeper, enlisted in Company B, 3d Regiment of Artillery, New York Volunteers, September 14, 1862, and served in that company until July, 1865, when he was honorably discharged. After his discharge her said son returned home and in January, 1866, was lost at sea, having sailed from Portland for Cuba in a vessel which was never heard from after sailing from Portland.

Her only other son was also lost at sea in 1878. Rockland, Maine, February 2, 1895.
