
AN ACT to amend chapter two hundred and eighty-four of the public laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-five, relating to surety companies.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. Section fourteen of chapter two hundred 2 and eighty-four of the public laws of eighteen hundred 3 and eighty-five, as amended by chapter eighty-six of the 4 public laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven is here-5 by amended by striking out the words "one dollar" in 6 the eighth line thereof and inserting the words 'two dol-7 lars' so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

. 'Section 14. Every surety company, not incorporated 9 in this State, applying for admission to transact business 10 therein, shall pay to the insurance commissioner, for the 11 use of the State, upon filing a copy of its charter or deed 12 of settlement and statement preliminary to admission, a 13 license fee of twenty dollars and a like sum annually for 14 each renewal of said license, and for each agent's certifi-15 cate, annually, the sum of two dollars. Said companies 16 shall also pay on or before the first day of May, annually, 17 a tax of two per cent upon all premiums received in excess 18 over losses actually paid during the year, on contracts 19 made in the State and over rebates on premiums allowed 20 to persons guaranteed. Said tax to be assessed and paid 21 in accordance with the provisions of section sixty-one of 22 chapter six of the Revised Statutes.'

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.
