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## STATE OF MAINE.

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RESOLVE in favor of the Maine State Prison.

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*Resolved,* That the sum of nineteen thousand dollars be  
2 and hereby is appropriated for and in behalf of the Maine  
3 State Prison, to be expended under the direction and  
4 supervision of the prison inspectors and warden of the  
5 state prison, for the following purposes: For paying out-  
6 standing indebtedness of the prison and furnish suitable  
7 working capital for the manufacturing industries therein,  
8 \$15,000; provided, however, that no portion of the goods  
9 manufactured in the prison shall be sold at retail or  
10 directly to the consumer. The warden shall sell the  
11 entire product at wholesale through the ordinary trade  
12 channels, and so far as practicable in large quantities; for

13 repairs on buildings and wall for 1895, \$3,000 ; for repairs  
14 on buildings for 1896, \$1,000.

### STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The appropriations called for in the accompanying resolve are for the following purposes :

The appropriation of \$3,000 to be expended in 1895, is to repair buildings and wall, at an estimated expense of \$2,000, and to improve and perfect the fire department of the prison, which will cost about \$1,000. One thousand dollars to be expended in 1896, is for estimated repairs in buildings and wall.

The appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars is needed for following purposes: There is a deficiency and indebtedness of about \$14,000, which has accrued during the past six years, and the balance of the \$15,000 is asked for, to be used as a working capital in buying stock.

The several departments have not paid the running expenses and support of the prisoners, but in comparison with the deficiencies since 1870, make a good showing.
