STATEMENT OF FACTS.

To whom it concerns, that I, Moses Barrows of the town of Oakfield, county of Aroostook, and State of Maine, certify that I received a letter stating the death of Asa A. Barrows, who died in Council Bluff, Iowa, with the bilious fever at the county poor farm. He died in September, 1881. I received my information from an Elder Hutchinson, Crescent City, Iowa.

STATEMENT OF FACTS TO ACCOMPANY RESOLVE
IN FAVOR OF LUCINDA BARROWS, HOUSE
DOCUMENT No. 63.

Mrs. Lucinda Barrows is the wife of the late Asa A. Barrows of Oakfield Plantation, who was a member of Company H, 20th Maine Volunteers. Said Barrows died somewhere in the West which is certified to by affidavits of responsible men who received letters at the time of his death, said letters have been lost, which debars her from receiving a State pension under the general law. She is now near seventy years of age, without any means of support. I have affidavits proving her marriage to said soldier also an affidavit from the nurse who attended him at the time of his last sickness and death. She has no children able to support her, and asks this pension to keep her from the poor house. She has been an industrious woman of good habits but is now unable to labor on account of sickness.
