STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE in favor of Josiah T. McLellan of Gorham.

Resolved, That there be paid the sum of eight dollars per
2 month commencing Jan. 1st, 1897 as pension to Josiah T.
3 McLellan of Gorham.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Josiah T. McLellan was born and lived for years in the town of Gorham. A few years prior to the beginning of the War of the Rebellion, he went to California. When the war broke out he enlisted there, was a good soldier and was honorably discharged and returned to Gorham, where he has since resided. Married has wife and one daughter who is of unsound mind entailing large expense on her father who is broken in health, cannot labor to any extent and has no property, he not being a resident of Maine at time of enlistment, is not eligible to State pension under existing law, he and his friends therefor ask that a special act may be passed for his relief.
