STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND NINETY-SEVEN

AN ACT to amend section 4 of chapter 58 of the Revised Statutes as amended by section 2 chapter 18 of the Public Laws of 1891 and to amend section 5 of chapter 58 of Revised Statutes as amended by chapter 125 of the Public Laws of 1887 relating to the Board of Agriculture.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. Amend section 4 of chapter 58 of the Revised

- 2 Statutes as amended by section 2 chapter 18 of the Public
- 3 Laws of 1891 by inserting after the word "husbandry" in
- 4 the fourth line the words 'and to the best methods of
- 5 building and maintaining public ways.' Also amend by
- 6 inserting after the word "efforts" in the ninth line the
- 7 words it shall also be the duty of the board by means of
- 8 maps, charts, cuts, drawings, printed or written articles,

9 lectures or otherwise to disseminate knowledge throughout 10 the state concerning the best known methods for the build11 ing and maintaining of highways including bridges and 12 sidewalks in the cities and towns of the state and particu13 larly to impart such information, in manner as aforesaid, 14 to the county commissioners of counties, the street com15 missioners of cities, the selectmen of towns and other 16 municipal officers whose duty it may be to have the care 17 and management of the expenditures of money and the 18 building and keeping in repair of the highways of the 19 state. Also amend by inserting after the word "thousand" 20 in the last line the words five hundred so that said section 21 as amended shall read as follows:

'Sect. 4. The board, by its secretary and one of its 23 members, shall hold annually, two farmer's institutes in 24 each county, and as many more as it deems expedient or 25 finds practicable with the means at its disposal, for the 26 public discussion of topics relating to husbandry and to 27 the best methods of building and maintaining public ways, 28 either independently or in connection with any organiza-29 tion devoted to the same general object, and it may issue 30 bulletins, employ experts, lecturers, a reporter or other 31 aids to enhance the usefulness of said institutes to the 32 public; and shall so far as practicable aid and encourage 33 agricultural societies and associations in their efforts. 34 shall also be the duty of the board by means of maps, 35 charts, cuts, drawings, printed or written articles, lectures 36 or otherwise to disseminate knowledge throughout the 37 state concerning the best known methods for the building 38 and maintaining of highways, including bridges and side-39 walks, in the cities and towns of the state and particularly

- 40 to impart such information, in manner as aforesaid, to the
- 41 county commissioners of counties, the street commissioners
- 42 of cities, the selectmen of towns and other municipal
- 43 officers whose duty it may be to have the care and man-
- 44 agement of the expenditures of money and the building
- 45 and keeping in repair of the highways of the state.

The members shall receive no compensation for time and

- 47 services, but shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred in
- 48 the discharge of their duties, two dollars a day for sub-
- 49 sistence and six cents a mile for travel. The whole
- 50 expenses under this section shall not exceed three thousand
- 51 five hundred dollars annually.'

Sect. 2. Amend section 5 of chapter 58 of the Revised

- 2 Statutes as amended by chapter 125 of the Public Laws
- 3 of 1887, by inserting after the word "State" in the ninth
- 4 line the words 'He shall compile statistics relating to the
- 5 public ways in the cities and towns of the state and make
- 6 such investigation relating thereto as he shall deem
- 7 expedient in order to secure better and more improved
- 8 highways in the state, and in his annual report shall make
- 9 such statements bearing upon the construction or mainte-
- 10 nance of ways and suggestions and recommendations con-
- 11 cerning the same as he deems appropriate, including
- 12 recommendations for any legislation which to him seems
- 13 expedient or necessary. County commissioners, munici-
- 14 pal officers and all other officers having the care and
- 15 authority over public ways and bridges throughout the
- 16 state, shall on request furnish said secretary any informa-
- 17 tion which they possess,' so that said section as amended
- 18 shall read as follows:

The board shall appoint a secretary, as its 'Sect. 5. 20 chief executive officer for a term of three years and until 21 his successor is appointed, and may prescribe his duties, 22 a part of which shall be by personal observation, investi-23 gation, and correspondence, to acquaint himself with the 24 methods and wants of practical husbandry, the means of 25 fertilization, and the adaptation of various products to 26 the soils and climate of Maine; also with the progress of 27 scientific and practical agriculture elsewhere, with a view 28 to the more complete development of the natural 29 resources of the state. He shall compile statistics relat-30 ing to the public ways in the cities and towns of the state, 31 and make such investigation relating thereto as he shall 32 deem expedient in order to secure better and more 33 improved highways in the state, and in his annual report 34 shall make such statements bearing upon the construction 35 or maintenance of ways and suggestions and recommenda-36 tions concerning the same as he deems appropriate, 37 including recommendations for any legislation which to 38 him seems expedient or necessary.

County commissioners, municipal officers and all other 40 officers having the care and authority over public ways 41 and bridges throughout the state shall, on request, furnish 42 said secretary any information which they possess. He 43 shall, annually, by the third Wednesday in January, pre-44 sent to the governor and council, a report of the doings 45 of the board, and the results of his own labors and investigations, together with useful communications, suggestions 47 and recommendations. Twelve thousand copies of said 48 report shall be printed, all bound in cloth, one-half of 49 such for the legislature, and the remainder, after reserving

- 50 a suitable number for foreign exchanges, for distribution,
- 51 under the direction of the board, among the agricultural
- 52 associations and the people of the state.'
