IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT  
HUNDRED AND NINETY-NINE.

AN ACT to amend Section thirty of Chapter 285 of the Public  
Laws of 1897, relating to Close Time on Salmon.

---

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in  
Legislature assembled, as follows:*

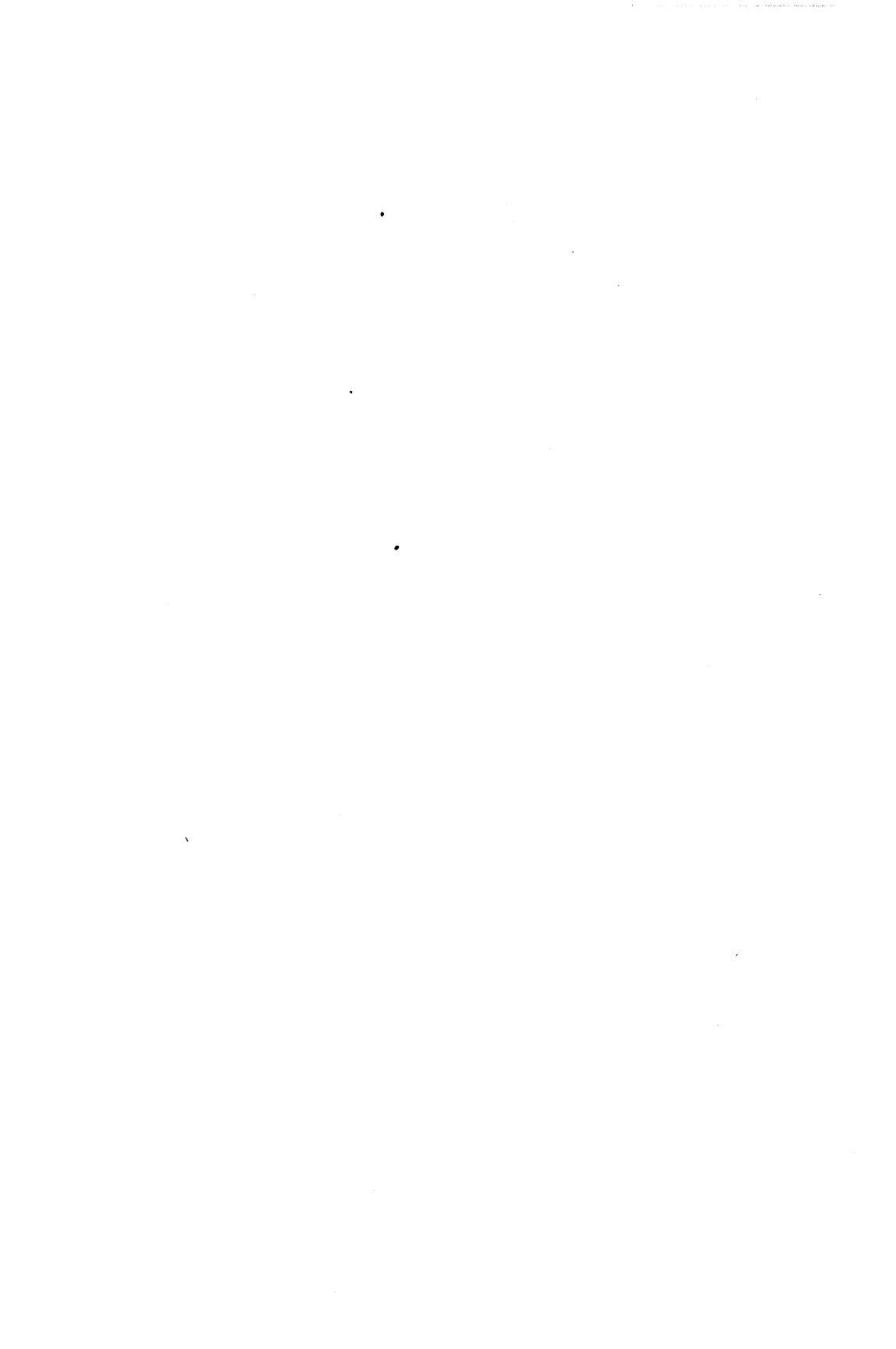
Section thirty of chapter 285 of the Public Laws of 1897,  
2 is hereby amended by adding to said section the following:  
3 'Provided further, that it shall be lawful to take salmon by  
4 weirs on the St. Croix river below the breakwater at the  
5 ledge, between the fifteenth day of May and the first of Sep-  
6 tember,' so that said section as amended, shall read as fol-  
7 lows:

'Sect. 30. From the fifteenth day of July to the first day of  
9 April following, there shall be a close time for salmon during

10 which no salmon shall be taken or killed in any manner,  
11 under a penalty of not more than fifty nor less than ten dol-  
12 lars, and a further penalty of ten dollars for each salmon so  
13 taken or killed.

Provided, however, that between the fifteenth days of July  
15 and September, it is lawful to fish for and take salmon by the  
16 ordinary mode, with rod and single line, but not otherwise.

Provided further, that it shall be lawful to take salmon by  
18 weirs on the St. Croix river below the breakwater at the ledge  
19 between the fifteenth day of May and the first of September.'
