## STATE OF MAINE.

!N THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND ONE.

AN ACT to amend section eleven of chapter thirty of the Revised Statutes, as amended by chapter forty-two of the Public Laws of 1899.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 11 of chapter 30 of the Revised Statutes, as 2 amended by chapter 42 of the Public Laws of 1899, is 3 hereby amended so as to read as follows:

'Section 11. There shall be for game birds an annual 5 close time in which it shall be unlawful to hunt, chase, 6 catch, kill or have them in possession whenever or how-7 ever killed, as follows: For wood duck, dusky duck, 8 commonly called black duck, teal, and gray duck the

9 elose time shall be during the months of January, Feb-10 ruary, March, May, June, July, August and December of 11 each year; for ruffed grouse, commonly called partridge, 12 and woodcock, from the first day of December to Septem-13 ber fifteenth next following of each year; for quail from 14 the first day of December to the first day of October; for 15 plover, snipe and sandpipers, from the first day of May 16 to the first day of August of each year. Whoever violates 17 any of the above named provisions of this section shall be 18 subject to a penalty of not less than five dollars nor more 19 than ten dollars for each bird so killed, caught, chased, or 20 had in possession in close time. No person shall, in any 21 one day, kill or have in possession more than twelve of 22 each variety of the above named birds during the respec-23 tive open seasons for each; nor shall any person, at any 24 time, kill or have in possession any ruffed grouse, com-25 monly called partridge, or woodcock except for his own 26 consumption within this State, except as hereinafter pro-27 vided, under a penalty of five dollars for each bird so 28 unlawfully killed or had in possession; nor shall any per-29 son at any time sell, or offer for sale, any ruffed grouse, 30 commonly called partridge, or woodcock, within this 31 State, under the same penalty; nor shall any person or 32 corporation carry or transport from place to place any of 33 the birds mentioned in this section, in close season, nor in 34 open season unless open to view, tagged, and plainly labelled 35 with the owner's name and residence and accompanied 36 by him, unlessed tagged in accordance with section 26 of 37 this chapter, under the same penalty. Any person, not 38 the actual owner of such bird or birds, who, to aid another 39 in such transportation, falsely represents himself to be the 40 owner thereof shall be liable to the same penalty; nor 41 shall any person or corporation carry or transport at any 42 one time more than fifteen of any one variety of the birds 43 above mentioned as the property of one person, under the 44 same penalty; and it shall be unlawful for a term of ten 45 years, to hunt for, take, catch, kill or destroy the caper-46 cailzie, or cock of the woods, so called, black game, so 47 called, or any species of the pheasant, except ruffed g.ouse 48 or partridge, under a penalty of fifty dollars for each 49 offense.'
