# STATEMENT OF FACTS TO ACCOMPANY HOUSE DOCUMENT No. 230.

The State Reform School was established fifty years ago, on the congregate plan. In 1893 the cottage plan was introduced by the erection and occupancy of the first family cottage. In 1898 the second family cottage was opened. The cottage or family plan has proved far superior to the congregate plan, and it is the desire of the trustees and of many of the friends of the school, including many State officials who have visited the institution, that a third family cottage be built as soon as practicable. For the construction and furnishing of such a cottage the committee recommend an appropriation of \$18,000.

For current expenses the committee recommend \$20,000 per year as formerly.

A coal pocket is greatly needed and many repairs should be made during the next two years upon the main building, barn, etc. For the coal pocket and repairs for 1901 the committee recommend an appropriation of \$3,000; and for repairs in 1902, \$2,000.

The trustees release many boys on probation. Some of the boys having no homes of their own must be provided with homes by the trustees, and they should be visited from time to time for the purpose of ascertaining their conduct, health and condition. No funds are now available for this purpose, and an appropriation of \$250 each year is recommended by the committee.

The sudden and extraordinary rise in the price of building material, and especially of steam pipes, valves and fittings, copper wire and electrical appliances and other metal work, in the year 1889, made the new power house and steam heating plant cost more than was anticipated when the original estimates were made. To defray this necessary expense the committee recommend an appropriation of \$2,212.31.
