STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE in favor of the town of Edmunds.

Resolved, That the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars 2 annually be and hereby is appropriated for the years nine-3 teen hundred and one and nineteen hundred and two to aid 4 said town of Edmunds to maintain roads and bridges in said 5 town and that the money be expended under the direction of 6 the county commissioners.



STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The population of Edmunds is 492; the valuation is \$68,949; the rate of taxation is three cents, three mills; the town debt is \$2,200. Edmunds is exclusively a farming town, having no manufacturing, or fishing, or other industry within its borders. It has twenty-three miles of road to keep up and has five large bridges besides a number of smaller ones; these six bridges are described as follows:

- (a) One near border line of town of Whiting, seventy-two feet long.
- (b) One in what was formerly part of town of Trescott, now part of Edmunds, seventy-six feet long.
- (c) One at Little Falls badly out of repair which will cost twelve hundred dollars to rebuild and must soon be rebuilt, one hundred forty-eight long.
- (d) One across Dennys river, one-half maintained by Dennysville, one-half by Edmunds, carried away in freshet in spring of 1900, now being rebuilt, about seventy-five feet in length.
- (e) Bridge crossing tide water known as lower bridge, two hundred feet long, one-half kept up by Dennysville.
- (f) Bridge at R. R. station one-half kept up by Dennysville. This is a steel bridge put in four years ago.
