A statement of the cause of the present printing deficiency must start with the fact that within a comparatively few years some ten state departments and commissions have been created by the legislature in addition to a number of new duties imposed upon the old ones by statute law. As a result of this and the steady growth in the legislative printing, the deficiency in the printing appropriation for 1897, for ten months of 1898 and for a portion of 1896 which came over into 1897, amounted to \$9,140.06. The present deficiency which covers the months of November and December, 1898, the year 1899 and the work completed in 1900 is \$6,386.26 larger. About \$3,000 of this is printing which has usually been carried into the new year, but which was completed and returned by the auditor on December 30th in season to be included in the bill of the past year. The causes for the balance are as follows:

1st. The growth of business in the departments.

2d. Extra printing occasioned by the war with Spain, and the subsequent reorganization of the militia.

3rd. Extra reports and memorials ordered by the legislature.

4th. The marked advance in the price of paper stock, beginning in the fall of 1899.

Any estimate on printing for the year 1901 must necessarily be based upon the figures for 1899. A considerable portion of the work of any year is determined by the special conditions obtaining at the time, some of which may never occur again. There is no way to determine in advance the printing of a legislative session. The reports of the state departments vary constantly from year to year, both in their scope and character, and

the hundreds of small items of miscellaneous printing used in their daily work are constantly changing. A report which, in one year, consisted of plain composition, might in the next run largely to rule and figure work with a corresponding increase of cost per page. There has been a growing tendency both in our own and other states, in deference to the popular demand and on account of its greater convenience in reference, to present official information in tabular form.

From the foregoing facts it will be seen how impossible it is to make any definite estimate in detail for the coming year. If no new departments of state are created, and no extra additions of reports are ordered at the present session, I should estimate that the printing for 1901 will cost about \$45,000 and for 1902 about \$35,000.
