STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE authorizing the land agent to sell certain public lots
in Dallas Plantation, in Franklin county.

Resolved, That the land agent is hereby authorized to sell
2 and convey to actual settlers thereon certain lands in Dallas
3 plantation, in Franklin county, constituting part of the school
4 lots of said plantation, if he deem advisable, for such price
5 per acre and on such terms of payment as he may deem
6 advantageous; provided, that in making sales of said lands
7 the equitable rights of persons claiming under said settlers
8 shall be considered and preserved; and provided, also, that
9 the proceeds of any sales made shall be added to the school
10 funds of said plantation.
