RESOLVE in favor of the town of Boothbay.

Resolved, That the sum of one hundred dollars and ninety-

- 2 nine cents be and hereby is appropriated from the treasury
- 3 to be paid to the town of Boothbay, to reimburse said town
- 4 for amount expended for support and committing to the
- 5 insane hospital one Matilda Anderson, an insane patient hav-
- 6 ing no pauper settlement in the State of Maine.



STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Matilda Anderson a native of Sweden came from Boston to the town of Boothbay in the State of Maine in July, 1902, with the family of W. A. McKinney, as a servant. On the twenty-ninth day of August, 1902, she became violently insane and was committed to the insane hospital at Augusta. She lived with Mr. McKenney's family from October, 1901, to the date of her commitment. The municipal officers of Boothbay are unable to find any party who knew her prior to October, 1901.

The town of Boothbay paid for attendance at Boothbay and for committing Matilda Anderson to insane hospital, \$41.10; for board and other expenses at hospital, \$59.89; total amount expended, \$100.99.
